He also announced that arrangements have already been completed for four emergency fields on the Spokane-Pasco run at Cheney, Lind, Sprague lake and Connelly.

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UNGRATEFUL PRISONER ESCAPES JAIL BEFORE DEDICATION CEREMONY

PALATINE, Ill., Aug. 17.—(AP) The reason Palatine didn't dedicate its new escape-proof jail this week was because the prisoner, captured especially for the event, escaped.

The capture was to have been held Tuesday. On Monday night, therefore, policemen scoured the town for jail guests. Finally arresting A. L. Flaika of Chicago.

The following day found Flaika gone, he having decided that the escape-proof jail was merely a figure of speech.

Chicago police yesterday arrested Flaika, and held him on a charge of jail-breaking for Palatine officials. It is not unlikely that when the Palatine jail is dedicated next week its prisoner will be Flaika, and the charge against him will be escaping from the jail being dedicated.

WESTBROOK, Mass., Aug. 17.—(AP) Through the courage and clear headedness of an army surgeon, who with his companion was seriously injured by a spectacular plane crash yesterday in woods of this Blue Hill in Milton, both men today were considered to have a good chance for recovery.

Their names, however, were on the danger list at the Fort Banks hospital here.

They were Major Claude W. Cummings, 48, flight surgeon at the Boston airport, and Reserve Lieutenant William R. Taplin, 45. Major Cummings has a possible fracture of the skull and other hurts. Lieutenant Taplin has a fractured jaw, cuts about the head and internal injuries.

Their army scout plane went into a tail spin about 400 feet above the ground and crashed into a tall oak. Stripped of one wing, the plane pancaked on top of the two fliers.

Major Cummings, first to regain consciousness after about 15 minutes, diagnosed his own injuries as a probable skull fracture. He extricated himself from the wreckage, freed his companion and administered first aid. The two men then set off in search of aid.

FLOR PRICES UP IN GRAIN ADVANCE

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—(AP) Despite heavy profit-taking sales and wheat evening up of accounts, wheat gained today showing substantial gains in price. With Canadian crop disaster reports becoming darker, the Chicago market finished at 19 or 10c from the day's top level, the highest point reached on the present upturn and 12 1/2c per bushel above values current on Wednesday. Export demand today for wheat from North America was fair, Great Britain and European continental countries both being buyers.

Wheat closed firm, 1 1/2c to 2 1/2c net higher, corn 3/4c to 2-4c, oats at 3-8c decline to 1/2c advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/4c to 1/2c.

FLOUR PRICES UP IN GRAIN ADVANCE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP) The only price change at the East Side market today was in catfishes from The Dalles. These fell \$2.10 to \$1.25 for crates of 25 or 27, according to price.

Wholesalers cut the price of watermelons to 2 1/2 to 3 cents. These were from 3 to 4 cents. Oregon melons were expected in next week.

In keeping with the sharp advance in the wheat market, the Sperry Flour company has advanced all brands 20 cents a barrel. In the last month or so flour prices have played checkers on the quotation boards, first up, then down, as wheat has wavered back and forth.

Butter, egg, poultry and fresh meat prices were unchanged.
