

CRISIS NEAR IN FIGHT ON FIRES IN TIMBERLAND

Civilian Resources Near Exhaustion As Flames Continue to Roar Through Six States—Two Men Lost in Chelan.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 17.—(AP)—A crisis in the annual battle between man and nature in the forests of Washington, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, British Columbia and California is being fought today with the possibility that civilian resources, close to exhaustion, may force acceptance of the war department's offer of federal troops to fight fires eating up thousands of acres of timberland.
