76 Years Ago Pioneer John Beeson Filed Claim on Wagner Creek Land; Place Has Remained in the Family

Wellborn Beeson calls attention to the fact that 76 years ago, August 16th, his grandfather, John Beeson, filed on a donation land claim on Wagner creek, near Talent, and that some member of the family has resided there ever since. His sister, Mrs. Anna Carter, resides there now.

Wellborn says the emigrant train in which his father crossed the plains and came to Oregon in 1853 was the largest train that ever came to the Rogue River valley, consisting of 100 wagons, 200 people and 1500 head of cattle. They endured all the hardships of those early days on the plains, including sickness, trouble with Indians, shortage of water at times, storms, etc.

When they reached the valley they took claims and started to make "little homes in the west." There were lots of Indians here at that time, and they were often very inquisitive and hard to get along with.

INTEREST KEEN IN POULTRY EXHIBIT

According to reports by A. N. Willets, superintendent of the poultry department of the Jackson County fair—a great deal of interest in that department is being shown, and poultry entries have been so numerous that prospects are for an overcrowded building this fall.

Inquiries for space in this building have come from all over the northwest, as well as from many local poultry breeders.

In connection with this department, an enclosure, 24 by 60 feet square will be constructed for the game exhibits provided by the state game commission which will consist of a number of birds that will be liberated in the Rogue River valley at the close of the hunting season, and other wild game.

Four bloodhounds ordered recently by the local forest service office have arrived in Medford from the state penitentiary at Salem and are ready for use, forest service officials say.

As soon as a fire is reported the hounds will be given a chance to do their stuff. The plan is to take them to the scene of the fire as soon as possible, and before fire fighters have arrived. Attempts will be made to get them on the scent of the guilty person and track him down.

Forest service officials are confident that many fire starters will be detected in this way.
