

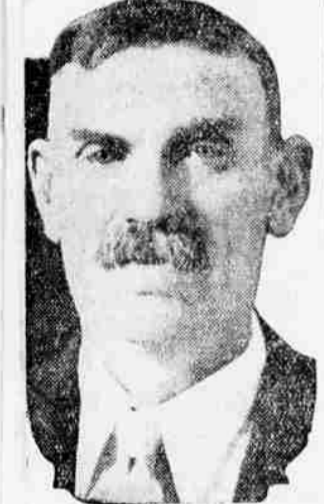
BOYLE COMING AS ASSISTANT CHIEF OF COPCO

General Manager Brewer Announces Advancement of Klamath Man to Medford Duty—H. P. Bosworth, Jr., Takes Vacancy

C. M. Brewer, vice-president and general manager of the California Oregon Power company, has announced appointment of J. C. Boyle, division manager of the Klamath division, to the position of assistant general manager of the California Oregon Power company, to take effect September 1.

The promotion will mean that Mr. Boyle will make his future headquarters at the general office of the company in Medford. Announcement also is made by Mr. Brewer that H. P. Bosworth, Jr., assistant secretary of the company, has been appointed division manager of the Klamath division to succeed Mr. Boyle. Mr. Boyle's promotion to the responsible position which he will assume is well earned, being the culmination of nearly 20 years' service with the California Oregon Power company. He first became affiliated with Copco in May, 1919, just after graduation from the University of California where he majored in civil engineering. His first position with the company was that of chairman on a survey crew, after which he took charge of the original surveys for the Copco No. 1 power plant. In 1921, Mr. Boyle became assistant engineer in charge of the construction of Copco No. 1 power plant, a position which he held until 1924. From 1924 to 1928 he acted as superintendent of construction for the company, during which time he had charge of the construction of Line 2 extension from Castella to Kennett, California, and in 1919 went to Klamath Falls where he had charge of the important work of constructing the Link River dam. In November, 1921, Mr. Boyle was appointed division manager of the Klamath division, a position which he has held up until this time. During the period from 1921 to date, the Klamath division, under Mr. Boyle's direction, has witnessed a steady and substantial growth and development until it is now one of the most important divisions of the entire Copco system. John Boyle has proved a most efficient civic worker and has been actively identified with civic and community work in Klamath Falls and vicinity. H. P. Bosworth, Jr., who will succeed Mr. Boyle as manager of the Klamath division, is a graduate of Cornell university, school of civil engineering, of Ithaca, N. Y. Mr. Bosworth first joined the Copco organization in July, 1923, working with a survey crew as chairman of the preliminary investigations of power sites. From December, 1923, to September, 1925, he worked with the Copco engineering department as assistant design engineer. During this time he helped design the East Side plant of Klamath Falls, Copco No. 2 and Prospect No. 2 power plants. From September, 1925, to date, he has worked in the office of the general manager in the capacity of an assistant. In February, 1928, he was formally elected to the position of assistant secretary, a position which he now holds.

STORAGE PLANT NOW RECEIVING FLOW OF PEARS

New \$100,000 Structure of Medford Ice and Storage Co. Placed in Operation—Refrigeration System is Model.

The pre-cooling and storage plant of the Medford Ice and Storage company, built at a cost of \$100,000, is now in operation. The first car of Bartlett for storage and pre-cooling was received Friday and the plant now has 25 or 30 cars of pears beneath its roof. The plant is one of the largest of its kind in the northwest, and is built to meet the future needs of the fruit industry of this section. It is equipped with modern machinery throughout, with a complete conveyor system, enabling the shipment of fruit from storage rooms to cars, with the minimum of handling. The conveyor system also allows for the immediate handling of pears upon delivery, without remaining in the sun. The refrigeration system is a model unit. Fruit can be chilled to 32 degrees here. This system is also equipped for the even distribution of low temperature without variation, a strong factor in the pre-cooling process. The Medford Ice and Storage company this season has completed and put in operation, an extensive development program. Besides the pre-cooling plant they erected an ice storage warehouse—the largest on the Pacific Coast with the exception of a similar structure at Nampa, Idaho. The ice storage warehouse was erected at a cost of \$75,000, and is equipped for the speedy handling of ice for refrigerator uses. Its capacity precludes the possibility of any change of an ice shortage during the fruit shipping season. The plant is owned by Medford and Astoria citizens, and is under the general management of O. T. Bergner.

PREPARE SCHOOLS FOR OPENING DAY; EXPECT OVERFLOW

L. R. Bloom and Harvey Young, janitors at the local high school, have been working during the vacation months on the cleaning of the building to have it ready for the opening of school. The walls have been cleaned and painted, which makes it possible for them to be washed. The wood-work has also been repainted and the floors varnished. Due to the crowded condition of the Junior high building, and the large enrollment, the old Salvation Army building has been rented for the school term, and the building has been cleaned and renovated during the last few days. It has been found necessary to hold another class in this building this fall. "The Salvation Army building will not be used for home rooms, but merely for overflow classes," said E. H. Hedrick, city superintendent, this morning. "We seriously regret having to use this building," he further stated, "but due to the present conditions, we find no alternative." A new floor is being built at the entrance of the Junior high school building by A. L. Wilkinson, local contractor. The Jackson and Roosevelt schools have been kalsomined through, and a number of windows replaced at the Roosevelt. Window frames and casings have also been repainted. At the Lincoln school minor changes have been made, besides repairs to the roof, and some kalsomining done. The Washington school has also had minor repair work done, besides the entire building has been cleaned. The janitors for the local schools who have been working all during the summer, and will continue during the school year are: L. R. Bloom and Harvey Young of the senior high school; E. W. Wilkerson of the Junior high school; who is also foreman of all the city school janitors; P. J. Kirkpatrick of the Lincoln school; E. S. Simpson of the Jackson school; W. R. Bullock of the Washington school; and E. A. Cripps of the Roosevelt school.

Copy of said annual audit shall be forwarded to the community chest. No Other Drives Allowed. No institutional member shall undertake to raise funds for any purpose whatever unless permission so to do is obtained from the board of directors of the Community Chest. As and when funds are received by the Community Chest they shall be deposited in a bank or banks designated by the board of directors to the credit of the "Community Chest of Medford, Inc." Books of the Community Chest shall be audited annually under the direction of the board of directors and copy of such audit shall be incorporated in the annual report of the board of directors, which shall be made at the time of the annual meeting of the corporation. Due publicity in the daily press and otherwise in the board reports shall be given to said annual report. The fiscal year of this Community Chest shall be from November 1st to October 31st in each year. Annual Meeting in December. The annual meeting of the corporation shall be held during the month of December in each year, on such day and at such place as the board of directors may decide. Special meetings of members may be held upon call of the board of directors. In the event that a majority of the institutional members of the Community Chest, or at least twenty-five individual members shall request a special meeting of the members of the corporation, the board shall call such meeting within thirty days of receipt of such request. The board of directors shall hold meetings at least once during each month of the year, except that meetings in July and August may be dispensed with in the discretion of the board. Special meetings may be held as decided by the board. A quorum shall be not less than five members of the board. Meetings of executive, budget, campaign and other committees shall be held as conditions warrant in the opinion of such committees. Any subscriber to the Community Chest may designate the institutional member to which he desires his subscription credited, but the board of directors shall determine whether his subscription shall be so credited in case the total as designated shall exceed the budget allowance. This constitution may be amended by a majority vote of those present at a regular or special meeting of the membership of this corporation, for which at least thirty days notice in the daily press has been given, such notice to include statement of the time and place of meeting.

COMMUNITY CHEST DETAILS

(Continued from Page One.) At the annual meeting of the corporation. At the first annual meeting after incorporation, nine directors shall be elected, three for three years, three for two years, and three for one year. Each annual meeting thereafter shall elect three directors as above stated. Of the three directors to be elected each year, two shall be nominated by the institutional members, each institutional member to have one vote in such nomination. The other member shall be nominated by the individual members, through a nomination committee, to be appointed by the president with approval of the board of directors. Details as to time of nominations, publication of names of candidates, etc., shall be as decided by the board of directors. Each Member Has Vote. Names of candidates submitted by institutional and individual members, as outlined above, shall be submitted to and voted upon at the annual meeting of the corporation, each member in attendance having one vote. The officers of the board of directors who shall serve for one year shall be the following: A president, first vice-president, second vice-president and treasurer. The board of directors may employ such assistants as it may deem necessary. The said officers shall perform such duties as shall be designated by the board of directors, which meeting shall be held within 14 days after the annual meeting and election of directors of the corporation. The board of directors shall annually appoint an executive committee, a campaign committee and such other committees as the said board of directors shall deem necessary. The number of members of such committee and its duties shall be determined by the board of directors. There shall be a budget committee, composed of at least five members appointed as hereinafter provided for a term of one year. Of the members of the budget committee, one more than half of the total number shall be designated by the institutional members of the community chest, and the remainder, including the chairman, shall be appointed by the board of directors with the approval of the board of directors. The duties and powers of the budget committee shall be as defined by the board of directors. Detailed Accounts Must Be Kept. Each institutional member shall submit to the community chest, at a time to be designated by the board of directors, an itemized, detailed statement of expenditures and income for the current fiscal year, together with a detailed estimate of expenditures and income for the fiscal year to come. These budgets shall be reviewed by the budget committee as instructed by the board of directors, and to the extent that the various estimates are approved by the budget committee and ratified by the board of directors, the same shall be included as a part of the whole sum to be raised by the community chest for the coming fiscal year. Each institutional member shall submit each month during the year, at a time and in form to be prescribed by the community chest, detailed statement of expenditures and income for the previous month and like estimate of income and expenditures for the month to come. At the end of each fiscal year each institutional member shall have an audit of its books, in such manner and by such means as is prescribed by the board of directors of the community chest.
