

# DAILY CUFFING ADMINISTERED TO BUCCANEERS

### Cubs Prove Loss of Grimm No Handicap in Hitting—Register 14 Hits Against Giant Pitchers—Athletics Lose Game.

Just by way of proving that they were not downhearted at the temporary loss of Charley Grimm, the Cubs slugged three Giant pitchers for 14 blows at the Polo grounds yesterday to win by 9 to 2 as the Pirates submitted to their daily cuffing by the furious Philles. The net result of those proceedings was to increase the margin of Mr. McCarthy's Bruins to ten and one-half games, a tidy margin even with the regular first baseman nursing a fractured left wrist.

Physicians and surgeons announced that Grimm's fracture, even though on his throwing arm, might not keep the regular first sacker out for more than three or four weeks.

McCarthy placed young Clarence Blair, the little Rock recruit, in temporary charge of first base, but dispatched a hurry call for Charlie Tolson, optioned to Los Angeles by the Cubs last spring. He is not considering "Chicken" Hawks of Toading, and denies he ever thought of seeking George Sisler of Boston in one of those "waiver" deals which some clubs know how to engineer late in August.

Charlie Root presided over the obsequies at the Polo grounds, giving the Cubs their third victory over the Giants in four games.

Harry Smythe of Asheville won the Duddy victory with Phil Collins. The score was 19 to 8, giving Burt Shotton's boys four straight over Dush's men.

All the rabbit blood was extracted from the ball they used in Brooklyn yesterday, and young Clio Duddy pitched the home team to a 4 to 0 triumph over the Cardinals, who thus fell below the 500 mark. Duddy scattered six hits while Clarence Mitchell permitted Del Cisquette to single in a first-inning crisis which yielded the game's only run.

The Braves divided a double header with the Reds, winning the first game by 7 to 1, and permitting the victors to edge out the second by 8 to 7. The Braves thus remained in the cellar, which they now hold by a margin of two full games under the rampaging Philles.

The Athletics surprised American league circles by stopping a series to the Browns yesterday through the medium of losing the final game by 7 to 5, but the Yankees permitted the White Sox to win by 4 to 3, leaving the standing of the first two clubs unchanged. The A's lead by twelve games.

Young Wesley Ferrell stopped the Senators cold with his second successive four-hit game, the Indians winning by 3 to 1. It was Ferrell's fourteenth victory.

Detroit slugged Bayne and Carroll hard to win the final from the Red Sox by 13 to 2. Uble was the winner.
