

FARM COUNCIL TO VIEW OPERATIONS OF SIMILAR UNITS

R. G. Fowler, county agent, Ted Sims, Jacksonville grange, and C. T. Baker, secretary of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, were appointed members of a committee to investigate the operations of other agricultural and marketing bodies at the meeting of the Jackson County Agricultural Council last night at the Hotel Medford. This group of three will draw by-laws and a constitution for the council, following their research.

Problems confronting farmers and agriculturalists of the county were brought up in interesting discussions by representatives of the civic and grange organizations present. Marketing and distribution of products occupied the principal part of the informal talks. Members of the group will attempt through their body to encourage a comprehensive advertising campaign of Jackson county products. Also they will encourage diversification in farming, regarded by many farm experts as the salvation of the farmer.

Lengthy arguments over the problems which the council should first take up were in order during the evening. Some of those present favored a drive for lower freight rates and land settlement. Others, however, were of the opinion that diversified farming as an aid to the farmer should occupy first place on the list of problems to be tackled.

Two representatives from each chamber of commerce and each one of the granges of the county will compose the members of the council. In localities where there is neither of these groups representatives from a civic or community organization will be chosen. In this way it will be possible to have the interests of every section of Jackson county represented.

From the council, which will total approximately 25 persons, an executive committee will be chosen.

MRS. KING WILL STAY IN MEDFORD

Lyla King, senior health nurse of the Jackson county unit, will remain in Medford at least one more year. This announcement, which came today through the local office will be welcome news to the scores of parents and children throughout the county who have learned to look forward to the visits of the popular nurse during the past two years of her work here.

Mrs. King a few weeks ago handed in her resignation, which was to go into effect September 1, with the explanation that she wished to devote her time to her home at Salem and to a few hobbies. However, after a conference with state health officials, the local nurse decided to remain at her Jackson county post for another year. A great enthusiast over Rogue River valley, Mrs. King is as happy as are her friends over the decision.

GRADE CROSSING ACCIDENT FATAL TO 3 IN FAMILY

PALO ALTO, Cal., Aug. 22.—(AP) Three dead and three possibly fatally injured was the toll of an automobile-locomotive crash today at a grade crossing near Mountain View.

The dead were Mrs. J. M. Hollingsworth, Palo Alto, and her two grandsons, Bobbie and Charles Joy aged 12 and 10 years, the sons of H. H. Joy, who was said to be a police officer.

In the Palo Alto hospital, Mrs. R. A. Nordberg, also Palo Alto and her seven-year old daughter Janet, suffered from fractured skulls, while Mrs. Pearl Kemp, who lives south of here, was unconscious from serious cuts and bruises.

J. E. Newman, engineer of the locomotive, a light switch engine traveling toward San Jose, said he saw the car approaching the tracks, and blew the whistle. The car, a heavy coach, approached at a low rate of speed, and drove in front of the engine, he said.

The automobile was wrecked. Mrs. Hollingsworth was said to have been the driver.

GREY HEADS ASSN. OF AUTO DEALERS

An association for the mutual benefit of the car dealers of Medford was formed at the Hotel Medford yesterday afternoon under the direction of Mr. Ernst, representative of the National Automobile Dealers' association of Chicago, who has been conferring with the local men for the past two days.

Ten of the 12 Medford dealers were present at the meeting and came into the organization, which is affiliated with the national association. The other two car merchants, unable to attend, have been notified of the organization, and it is expected that they will join the group.

Harold Grey, of the Crater Lake Automobile company was elected chairman of the local association, the only officer chosen. Meetings will be held once a month, the time to be decided later. The affiliation with the national association will give members of the local club benefit of information gathered from the entire industry, keeping them notified as to factors concerning the various target auto shows throughout the country and other interesting news.

SPONGE IN NOSE BEATS FAVORITE IN CHICAGO RACE

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—(AP) The state's attorney's office today inquired into the circumstances surrounding a race at the Hawthorne track yesterday in which Click, the favorite, finished seventh in a field of eight.

Officers were told that the three year old's chances of winning the race were ruined by a sponge stuffed in the thoroughbred's left nostril.

The sponge so obstructed the animal's breathing that he slowed down perceptibly in the stretch, despite every effort of his jockey. The sponge was found by Dr. J. M. Kaiser, track veterinarian. He said a button hook was attached to the sponge, indicating that some one was attempting to remove the sponge at the time Dr. Kaiser appeared.

Click was a 2 to 1 favorite. The race was won by Crofton, which paid \$15.52 for \$1. There was only a mild play on Crofton at the track, but officers were told that large sums were wagered on Crofton in other cities, especially St. Louis. Crofton is owned by A. A. Harrott, of Reno, Nev.

PICKERS ARE NEEDED FOR LOCAL ORCHARDS

"At the present time I can place a large number of pickers," he said this morning, adding that he had had around 20 or 40 calls from the growers throughout the valley reporting jobs available. "This will be good news for our local boys, as well as some of the newcomers to Medford in search of temporary work, and it will be a case of first come, first served," he said.

FATAL AUTO CRASH ON REDWOOD HIGHWAY

CHERRYBENT CITY, Cal., Aug. 22.—(AP)—W. H. Hoffman, 22, of Atwood, Tenn., was crushed to death and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Hoffman, seriously injured when their automobile skidded and plunged over a 15-foot embankment on the Redwood highway near here yesterday.

A coroner's jury last night held the accident to have resulted from carelessness on the part of young Hoffman, who the jury declared had been driving at an excessive rate of speed.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman both received fractured skulls and other injuries, but are expected to recover.

TROEH AND PAYNE FAVORED TO WIN ON CLAY PIGEONS

VANDALIA, Ohio, Aug. 22.—(AP) Frank Troeh, of Portland, Oregon, and Gus Payne, of Oklahoma City, appeared today as the outstanding candidates for the Grand American handicap trap shooting championship, to be held at the shooting grounds here tomorrow at the culmination of the North American tournament in session here since Monday.

Troeh yesterday won the championship of all state champions in a final match with Payne after the two had broken 199 out of 200 targets. Troeh broke the next 25 extra clays in the shoot-off, but Payne missed one.

A preliminary match for entrants in the Grand American handicaps was scheduled today, at 100 targets from the 16 to 25 yard line. Guy V. Dering, of Columbus, Wisconsin, was elected president of the American Trapshooting association last night. Vice presidents re-elected were John W. Fehlsman, Lancaster, Pa., and Isaac Andrews, Spartansburg, S. C. Sam Sherman, Salt Lake City, Utah, was chosen vice president to succeed O. N. Ford, of Del Monte, California.

LEGION POST PLANNING SPECIAL DANCE SERIES

Much interest throughout the entire valley is being taken in the annual Labor Day ball of the American Legion, scheduled for Monday, Sept. 2nd.

This is the first of a series of special holiday dances to be staged by Medford post during the coming season. Present plans call for Legion affairs on Labor Day, Halloween, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas. The committee in charge of the dances is headed by H. L. Brown, chairman and is composed of the post executive committee augmented by several other prominent Legion workers.

TO CONDUCT COUNT STUDENTS IN FRUIT

Next week, under the direction of the school officials, a survey will be made of all the fruit orchards and packing houses in the valley, to determine the number of high school students employed. Providing there are a large number of students working, it may be possible that the beginning of school will be delayed a week, but according to the present outlook, it will not be necessary for the opening of school to be postponed," said E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of schools this morning.

According to Chris Gottlieb there are a number of positions open in the fruit, which might cause a shortage if the high school employees were removed.

RESOLUTION NO. 256
A RESOLUTION declaring the intention of the council to cause Minnesota Avenue to be repaved by resurfacing with an asphaltic concrete roadbed—with non-skid surface, between Geneva and Crater Lake Avenue in the City of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property, providing for a meeting of the council to consider protest against said construction and providing for the setting of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof by the Recorder.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF MEDFORD, OREGON:
Section 1. That it is the intention of the council to cause Minnesota Avenue between Geneva and Crater Lake Avenues to be repaved by resurfacing with an asphaltic concrete roadbed—with non-skid surface for the full width of said street, and to assess upon each lot or part thereof adjoining said improvement its proportionate share of the cost of said improvement.

Section 2. The Council will meet in the Council Chamber at the City Hall on the 3rd day of September, 1929, at 7:30 p. m., at which time and place the owners of said adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council and show cause, if any, why said street should not be repaved by resurfacing with an asphaltic concrete roadbed—with non-skid surface, and why said property should not be assessed for the construction thereof.

Section 3. The City Recorder is hereby directed to serve notice upon the property owners attending by posting the resolution once in a daily newspaper printed, published and of general circulation in said city at least ten days before the date of said meeting and by posting five copies of this resolution in five public and conspicuous places in said city for a period of ten days prior to said meeting.
