

CRADLE INFANT PREFERS CHEWING TO PIPE SMOKING

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Billy Howard, aged 2½ years, presents his claim as being the youngest person qualified to write tobacco testimonials—pipe, cigarette or chewing.

Just big enough to hold securely the man-sized pipe which he smokes twice a day, Billy, whose baby lip still persists, confides that he really prefers chewing to

bacco but that his parents won't let him have it. Billy, who had been unhealthily from birth, was so weakened a year ago that his life was despaired of. It was then that the doctor suggested that he be allowed tobacco as a stimulant and possibly as an aid to creation of an appetite. In the year that has followed Billy has gained in weight and is now apparently a normal child—but he is an inveterate smoker. His parents are trying to break the child of the habit and have reduced the amount of his smoking to two pipes a day.

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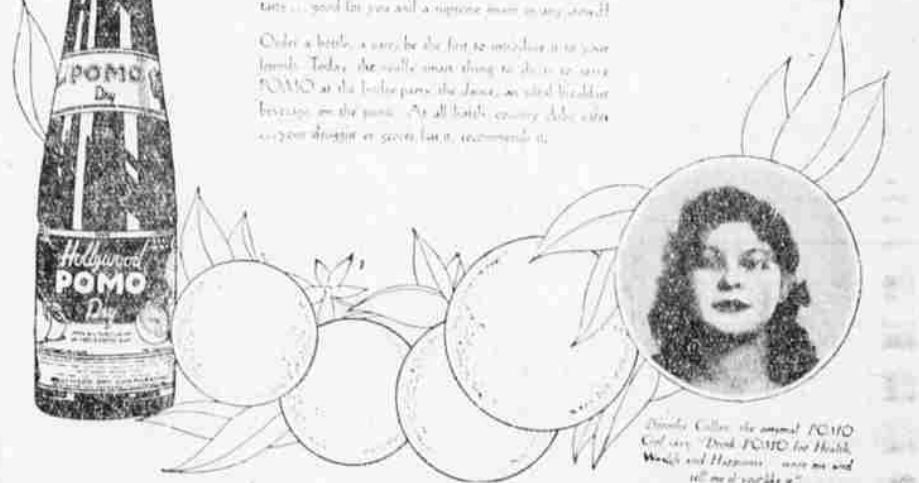
