Other entrants agreed to permit her to start Saturday without loss of time. Miss Perry said this afternoon, however, that she doubted that she would continue in the race.

### PASS PAPER SAYS PEOPLE UNITED IN CUT-OFF DISPUTE

Bert Anderson, chairman of the roads and highway committee of the Chamber of Commerce, received the following letter today from Earl E. Voorhes, managing editor of the Grants Pass Courier, leader of the fight against the proposed Williams road cut-off, promising to print today's issue the local view on the road.

The letter states that Grants Pass is "united as never before" in opposition to the building of the road.

The committee has been informed by a number of Grants Pass citizens that opinion is divided on the merits of the road and that, if put to a vote, the result would show about even.

The sentiment from other sources is a willingness to help Williams Creek to become "unbottled," if, and when, Medford can be deprived of any benefits. There is a strong anti-Medford sentiment, however. The letter reads:

Grants Pass, Oregon, August 22, 1929. Mr. Bert Anderson, Medford Chamber of Commerce, Medford, Oregon.

I wear Sirs. Received your letter and the statement of the Medford chamber this morning, and had them put into type immediately.

However, later in the day we discovered that the Courier tonight would be too crowded for a story of this length, and it is being held until tomorrow when it will appear in full.

From your letter I take it you are not aware that several paragraphs of your letter to our county court were printed last night in the Courier of August 18, more than a week before your newspapers gave out the letter.

However, out of courtesy to your views I am having those portions reprinted again as Grants Pass will be fully advised of your attitude.

The Daily News declares that the Courier's attitude in opposition to your cause road plan does not represent that of this city and section.
