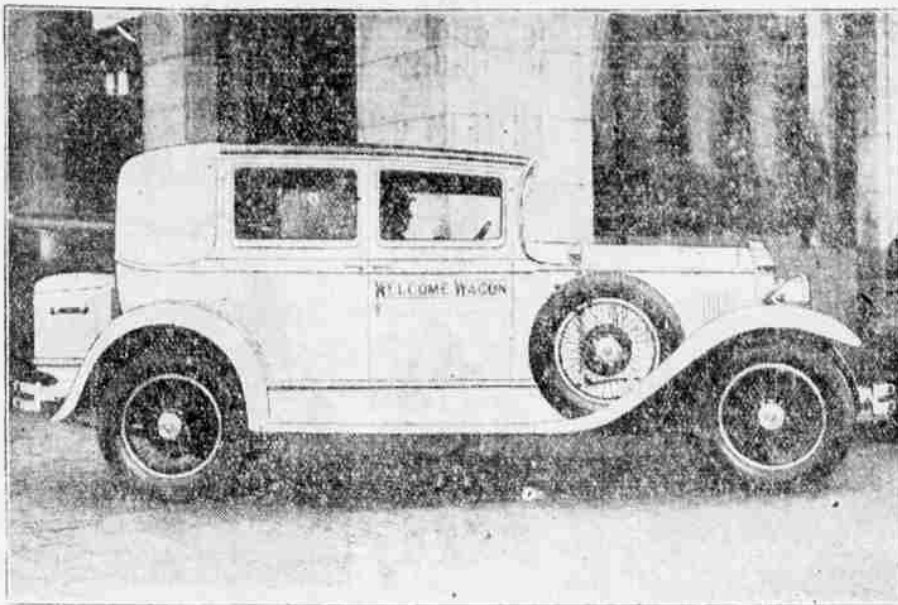


Courier of Good Will to New Residents

Gottland--Link to Middle Ages

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—History, one of its chief "products," has again brought Gottland Island, in the Baltic Sea, into the world news. Sixty-seven Byzantine gold coins, probably buried when Gottland was the trade center between northern Europe and the Near East, have been unearthed on the island.

In seven hours, modern steamships from Stockholm land the traveler at Visby, largest city and principal gateway to the island. Incidentally, in this short time, the pages of history turn back several centuries," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic Society.

Old Wall Gives Medieval Touch

"From the steamer deck the old gray stone wall which was built around Visby in the twelfth century resembles the ramparts of an old fort; but inside more than 10,000 sturdy islanders have lived peacefully since before American Colonial days.

"A twentieth century model bicycle mounted by a native in modern European attire, an electric light bulb hanging in the socket of a foot-long bracket attached to the side of a corner building, and now and then the rooping horns and shodlike back firing of automobiles lend a modern touch to the town, but none of these have a marked effect upon the atmosphere of the Middle Ages that prevails there.

"Narrow, cobbled, but spotlessly clean streets, run in crazy fashion within the walls. Now and then they pass modern buildings which seem out of place, for in these alleylike thoroughfares no wider than the sidewalks of many streets in our larger cities, the steep gabled buildings, perhaps nearly as old as the wall, still holding their own against modern encroachments. If you are fortunate a native may show you his cellar where the wealthy merchants of Visby's prosperous days stored their rich wares.

INSPECT YOUR TIRES BEFORE VACATION TRIP SAYS DURANT DEALER

Warm weather and worn tires are two causes of blow-outs. Motorists often forget this combination and the results in many cases are disastrous to families. Dealers Mr. Robin, head of the local Durant organization.

Vacation days are here and thousands of motorists are either on the highways driving to some favorite rendezvous or are planning an outing," he states. "It is my advice to every motorist to inspect his tires carefully before starting on a trip, and if they are not in good condition to replace them. After all, tires today are not expensive—at least not so costly as a wrecked car or injured occupants.

"Many motor car owners forget that a blow-out occurring when a car is traveling at a high rate of speed can cause skidding and overturning. The reason being that the resistance offered by a deflated tire as it rolls along the road is so great as to cause the car to sway, and in some instances to swing sharply around.

"In order to increase tire mileage it is well for the motorist to inspect the air pressure in his tires frequently. The pleasure of driving will be enhanced to a marked degree. Tires should always be kept properly inflated and it is good practice, in this regard, to have them checked once a week.

"When driving in hot weather, one should take into consideration the expansion of the air in the tires. When testing tires under these conditions, it is a good plan to force the pressure a few pounds under what it would be in cooler weather. The heat during the day will bring the pressure up to normal."

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Charles C. Crummett of Leadville, Colorado, lives five miles from the top of Tennessee Pass, which is

one of the highest passes in Colorado and the only transcontinental highway open in that state in the winter. It is on the Pikes Peak-Crested Butte highway. Snow falls five feet deep in winter. In spring the mud is heavy and thick, as the pass road has no bottom in spots. Between May 1, 1925, and May 25, 1929, Crummett pulled 300 cars out of the snow or mud with his team of horses. Of these, only five were Fords. Ten Ford cars and trucks go over the Pass in one of any other make, he writes, and seven Ford cars go over for each big one of all makes. Two hundred and thirty cars in the Model A price class were pulled out by him. Only two were Model A's.
