The Rogue River Canning company will start operations this week canning tomatoes. Manager H. C. Doucette said yesterday, and will continue to can beans as long as they last. They want all the beans they can get, as there is a strong demand. The cannery expects to start canning beans Tuesday, and expect to can between 100 and 150 tons, and be able to fill all their orders. They will employ 125 women and girls. The cannery cafeteria will be operated this season, and preparations have been made for its opening the coming week.
