## CUSHMAN TROPHY WON BY TILDEN

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 24.—(AP)—William T. (Big Bill) Tilden, defeated George M. Lott, Jr., of Chicago, third ranking American tennis star, in the final match of the 13th Newport Casino invitation tennis tournament here today. The scores were 6-2, 3-6, 6-4, 5-7, 6-2. The victory gave Tilden permanent possession of the Cushman trophy as a result of previous wins in 1926 and 1927.

Before the final set started the referee called on the crowd, over-whelmingly for Lott, to refrain from applause. Tilden served a love in the first game, and Lott held the second. During this game many of the crowd disregarded the referee's request and applauded Lott. Tilden turned and glared at the stands for almost a minute. This gesture of displeasure so annoyed a few of the spectators that they booed the former world's champion when he next found fault with a line-man's decision the hitting, probably the first ever heard in the historic and exclusive casino, was quickly stopped by the presence of the majority.

Hall played a remarkably steady game during the afternoon doubles match maintaining his services on each of his performances. Mercer was broken six times during the 84 games, Doug four times and Lott once.

## NEW SWIM TIME MADE BY GOTHAM MISS, HAWAII LAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A slim miss from New York City and a tall island boy from Honolulu skidded over Peleihakoe pool today to establish two new swimming records in the National A. U. U. swimming championships.

To little Eleanor Holm of the New York Women's Swimming association went the honor of setting a new time in the 110-yard backstroke for women. She led an imposing field to the finish in the time of 1 minute 22 1/2 seconds to break the old mark of 1 minute 30 1/2 seconds. Her effort also bettered the 100-meter record of 1 minute 25 1/2 seconds.

Before the powerful strokes of Clarence "Buster" Crabbe, outer-ger canoe club star, the 200-meter medley world's mark became a figure of the past. He covered the course in 4 minutes 12 1/2 seconds to retain the title he won here last year. The former record was 4 minutes 14 1/2 seconds.

The Hollywood Athletic club team captured the senior men's national outdoor 880-yard relay title. The time was 9 minutes 45 1/2 seconds. Second place went to the Olympic club of Oakland.

In the junior 440-yard breaststroke, Richard Gander of the Los Angeles A. C. was crowned champion. His time was 6 minutes 41 1/2 seconds, and he won with several yards to spare. Henry Von Holt, unattached of San Francisco, came in second, and C. Klaus of the Pacific Coast club, Los Angeles, was third.

## WORLD TITLE WON ANEW BY HELEN

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 24.—(AP)—In the hardest final round battle she has had since the English star Kitty McKane forced her to an extra set in 1925, Helen Wills won the national women's championship for the sixth time before a gallery of 6,000 at the West Side stadium this afternoon.

Once again the stubborn challenge came from the hard-driving requet of an English player and it was only after 40 minutes of hotly fought and thrilling tennis that the queen of the courts overcame the brilliant Mrs. Phoebe Watson of England's Wightman club team by scores of 6-4, 6-2.

With this final victory went undisputed singles supremacy over the feminine players of the world for the third time in as many years, as the Berkeley, Cal., tennis marvel previously this season has won the open championships of England and France.

## FORMER FOOTBALLER GETS LONG SENTENCE
