Today Over the Pacific. Trouble in Jerusalem. On a Crimson Gallows. Why Stocks Go Up.

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Flying the Pacific, Dr. Eckener sends messages around the world in all directions, asking for weather reports, giving latitude and longitude.

Trans-Atlantic flying calls for airplanes that will be as independent of weather as surface steamers are now. It is improbable that the balloon type, offering a huge target to wind and lightning, will be the ultimate type.

The all-metal dirigible with passengers carried on top, very powerful with a keel of light metal to strike the water first, may be the next step.

News from Jerusalem is disquieting. On Friday the Jewish Sabbath eve, nine Jews and three Arabs were killed and 110 others were injured in an outbreak of racial and religious hatred.

ZEPELIN AT EASE IN LOS ANGELES

ECKENER PREPARING FOR FLIGHT EAST AT 11 O'CLOCK TONIGHT

Completes 5800-Mile Flight From Tokyo in 78 Hours, 58 Minutes—First Non-Stop Jaunt Across Pacific Ocean—Interesting, But Lacking Thrills of Germany-to-Japan Hop, Says Lady Passenger—Dr. Eckener Taken Ill—Better Weather Reports and Co-operation Is Need On Air Lanes, View of Sir Hubert.

LOS ANGELES MUNICIPAL AIRPORT, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The Graf Zeppelin came to earth in Los Angeles at 5:11 a. m. today. The flight from Kasumigaura, Japan—2,800 miles—was completed in 78 hours and 58 minutes.

The third leg of the sky cruise around the world, completed in this morning to the 60-foot stub mast here marked 16,800 miles since departure from Lakehurst, N. J., August 7.

Sixty persons made the voyage, 41 in the crew and 19 passengers. The final leg of the circumnavigation voyage will be to Lakehurst, some 2,500 miles, and will be started within 36 or 48 hours. During the stay in Los Angeles it will be moored to the mast.

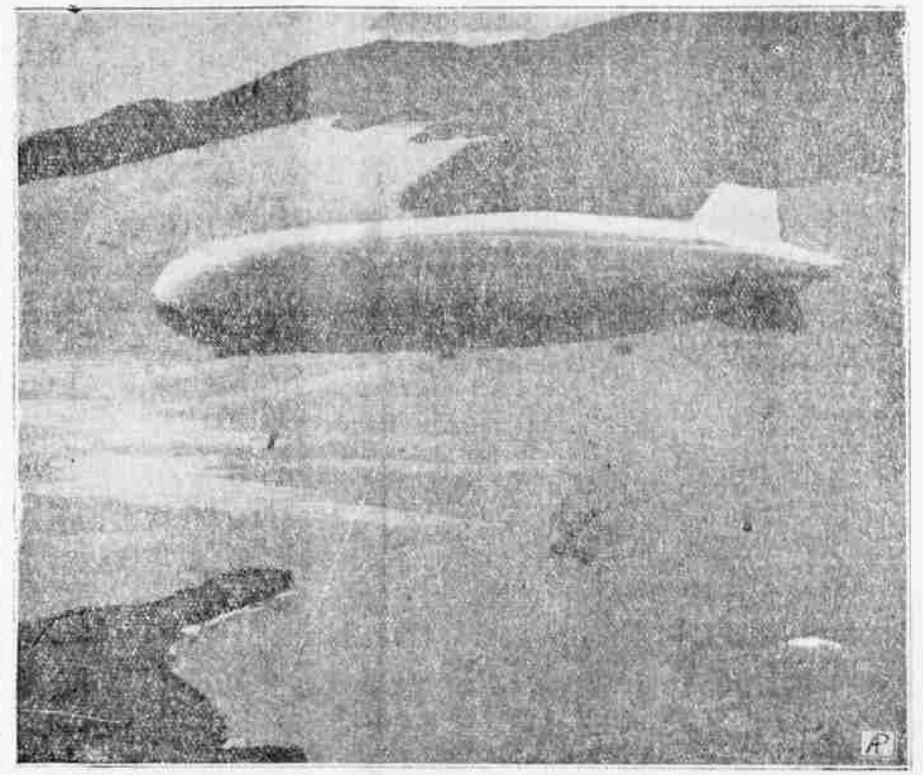
Planes Circle Zep. Six naval planes circled overhead as the big silver ship came to earth. The planes appeared as they circled the 77-foot globe-circling ship.

At 5:25 a. m. the Zeppelin began to move slowly towards the mooring mast, carried by the American marines and blue-jackets. The assembled multitude was awed into silence by the impressive spectacle of the great silver craft majestically going through the operations of landing and mooring.

The nose of the newest trans-Pacific liner touched the mooring mast at 5:25 a. m. Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the Graf Zeppelin, who was seriously ill for two days of the trip from Tokyo, was rushed by motor to a downtown hotel.

He was highly enthusiastic over the success of the trip and convinced that it thus far has demonstrated the commercial feasibility of lighter than air transport in ocean commerce. It was indicated by those with whom he talked during the last hours of the trip.

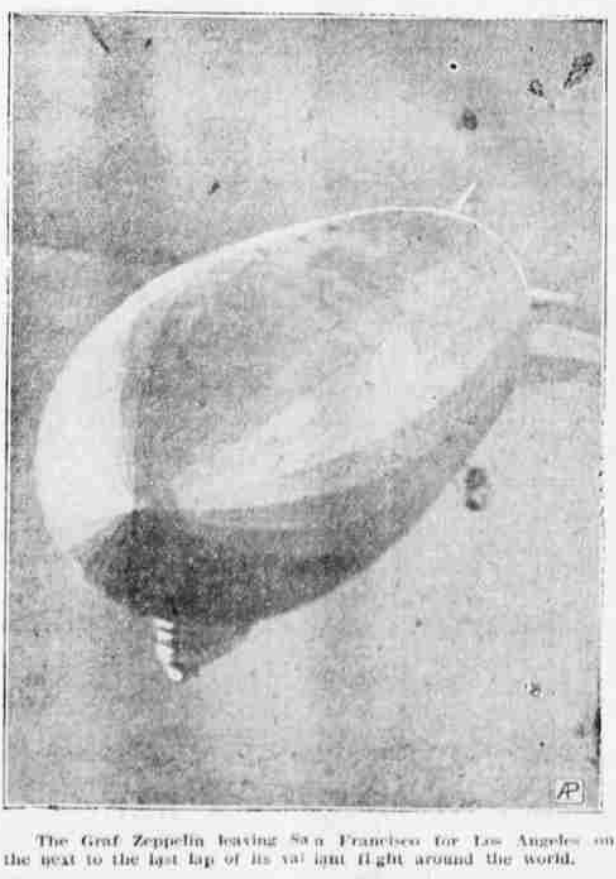
W. E. Rosenbaum Lands Among Rocks Near Hornbrook—Bringing Curtiss Jenney Here From Santa Rosa for Own Use.

THADEN IS WINNER OF AIR DERBY

Pittsburg Aviatix Completes Long Grind From Santa Monica to Cleveland at 1:30 P. M.—Blanche Noyes, Gladys O'Donnell, Amelia Earhart, Follow in Order.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Still in the lead of the women's transcontinental air derby, Mrs. Louise McPheridge Thaden of Pittsburg appeared over the Cleveland municipal airport at 2:14 p. m. completing the last leg of the air race from Columbus where she had taken off at 1:30 p. m.

The undaunted woman flier who led the air derby most of the way from Santa Monica, Cal., where it started, August 18, appeared certain of victory by more than an hour of elapsed time, but her achievement will have to be checked by the unofficial judges before her victory is made certain.

After roaring across the finish line, the lady pilots circled the field and made safe landings, while the crowds attending the national air races cheered.

In fourth place came Amelia Earhart, the trans-Atlantic flier, who set her plane down on the municipal airport at 2:29.
