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HOWELL HARVEST OPEN WEDNESDAY BOSCS SEPT. 3RD

The picking and packing of Howell pears will start Wednesday. The Howell crop is estimated at 85 to 90 cars. The crop is figured at "15 per cent light."

The picking of Boscs is scheduled to start the week of September 8. Most of this variety will be placed in cold storage for future delivery.

According to fruit authorities, September will be a record breaking busy month for the fruit industry.

The month will see the peak of the summer shipments of Bartlett's and the picking of the winter varieties. The Bartlett's are slow maturing and the later varieties are catching up with them. Weather conditions have been ideal the most for fruit development.

The Pinnacle Packing company, Raymond H. Reber, manager, will start its packing operations Wednesday. Its Bartlett's were sold to the canneries.

The Rogme River canning company will start its pear canning operations this week, along with its beans and tomato canning.

Several plants were not picking today, as picking was not general in the orchards Sunday.

START IMPROVING DEAD INDIAN ROAD

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 26—(Special.) Work is already under way for the expenditure of \$24,000 of county money on the Dead Indian road. The first part of the construction work is being carried forward by a force of 50 men on a stretch of road in the vicinity of the Hatch ranch. A rock crusher is being assembled and a compressor is being used in preparation for blasting. According to the statement of County Engineer Paul Rynning, men are being taken off all other construction work in the county as fast as they can possibly be spared and put onto the Dead Indian work. The survey for the new road has been made with the idea of making a fine permanent road rather than for an improvement of the old route. Work this year will be carried toward the intersection of the State oil road with the Dead Indian road, while next year improvement will be made on the narrow stretch just beyond the State junction.

AIR MAIL STAMPS FOR FIRST FLIGHT IN GREAT DEMAND

Philatelists from all over the country are liberally swarming the Medford postoffice and chamber of commerce. Air mail letters to be sent from here when the first flight is made from the new airport are being received by the hundreds.

So far nearly one thousand of the self-addressed envelopes have been received at the chamber of commerce office and several hundred more are being held at the postoffice. Postmaster Warner says, more than 75 were received in the mail this morning at the chamber of commerce alone.

Publicity for the new airport and first flight has been printed in several of the stamp collector's magazines. The letters which they will mail will bear the cachet and special cancellation for the first mail sent from the municipal field, and will be valuable to collectors.

The letters come from every state in the union and from Canada and Mexico. Many of them are for collectors and as many as 25 come to be sent back to the same man or stamp agency. Others, however, are to be sent to individuals.

Among those arriving this morning were several from Medford, Mass. Ted Baker, chamber of commerce secretary, will send a special greeting with those from the Medford of the Pacific to the Medford of the Atlantic.
