

### CENTRAL POINT VOTERS DEFEAT BUS TRANSPORT

At a special school election held in Central Point last evening the proposal to provide transportation for all pupils of the district residing more than one and one-half miles from the school building was defeated by the close vote of 22 to 23.

The proposal to provide busses was brought to a vote through a legal petition presented to the school board by the people of the outlying sections demanding an election. The cost of providing the transportation would have been about \$3500.

Although a light vote was polled in the district, the outlying part of the district was said to be favorable to the proposition, while the sentiment in town was largely against the proposal. The school board took a neutral position believing the matter was entirely a question to be decided by the taxpayers.
