**AIRPORT FIELD READY

**WALL STREET REPORT**

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—(Special.) Money advanced from 7 to 8 per cent today and the stock market ran into a heavy storm of selling. Early gains of 1 to 2 points were cut down or wiped out and by early afternoon many of the recent leaders were selling 1 to 2 points below yesterday's final quotations. In the early outbreak of buying, more than 20 issues, including half a dozen rails, were lifted to new high records.

Selling stopped for a time in the late trading when investment calls were ordered up. The new high Atholton led the advance with a jump of 7 1/2 points to 28 1/2. Baltimore and Ohio also reached new high ground at 14 1/2, up 3 Delaware and Hudson's gain

assumed to 2 1/2. Royal Dutch was irregular, with total sales up \$100,000. Shell, which usually moves up \$100,000, was up 3 1/2 to 29 1/2, the highest high since 1927. It opened 40 1/2, reflecting its profit of \$100,000. The closing price of gold bullion shot to 107 1/2.
