

KEEP ALIVE PEACE IDEA OF NATIONS

German Foreign Minister Pleads for Continuance of Spirit Which Prompted Signing of Anti-War Pact August 27, 1928—Development Depends On Common Interest.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Today is the anniversary of the first solemn meeting at which the pact for the outlawing of war was signed in Paris. The act of signing was followed on July 24 by the ratification of President Hoover. Meanwhile almost all countries besides the signatories have manifested their resolution to adhere to the pact which thus envelopes today almost our whole civilized world. The pact which denounces as a crime war as an instrument of national policy has put the development of international law on a new basis. But the living reality of the pact and its influence on practical relations will depend not only on its judicial contents but in the first place on what the governments and the nations themselves put into it. If the governments and nations keep alive within themselves the spirit which inspired the solemn meeting at Paris on that memorable day, August 27, 1928, history

will be able to consider that day as the turning point in the evolution of nations. The rhythm of our present life is more hurried today than it used to be. The spirit of solemn gatherings and the other clear insights which spring from them are lost again in the hurry of our everyday life. But Aug. 27 ought to be a day of commemoration uniting all nations, as it never had been possible in any other historic event, in the consciousness of their common interest in the maintenance of peace.

ABANDON TEST THREE FAVORED SPEED PLANE FOR LONG SWIM ENGINE IS WEAK LAKE ONTARIO

Lieutenant Williams Unable to Get Schneider Cup Entry Into Air—U. S. and Italy Out of Race—Plan New Engine.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Aug. 27.—(AP)—After two weeks of futile trials, Lieut. Alfred Williams has given up his attempt to get the Schneider cup, the trophy which would satisfy the navy department that his ship was worthy of competing. The navy speed race abandoned his idea yesterday after three attempts had failed, the second of which was hindered by engine trouble and which proved that the 24 cylinder motor did not have enough power to get the 4000 pound craft off the water and into the air for the speed trials. The failure leaves the United States without an entry for the Schneider cup and places England as the sole nation to compete, the Italian government having withdrawn its team yesterday following the death of Captain Giuseppe Berta, its leading pilot, and the loss of his plane. Williams, however, according to Lieutenant Commander John Popen, who has been the pilot's sponsor, will install a new motor in the ship, and make an attempt to then get the craft into the air in an effort to set a new speed record for seaplanes over the three kilometer course.

George Young, Ernest Vierkoetter and Georges Michel Pick of 400 Entrants in 15-Mile Paddle for Wrigley Prize.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Among three entered international and in prospect in the Wrigley 15-mile marathon swim in Lake Ontario here tomorrow. In a field of more than 400 entries, three stand out in advance calculations—George Young of Canada, Ernest Vierkoetter of Germany, and Georges Michel of France. Young first jumped into fame when he captured the first Wrigley marathon at Catalina island three years ago. Vierkoetter won the second and Michel took down most of the prize money last year although he failed to finish. Although Young, Michel and Vierkoetter seem to hold the inside track in previous forecasts, there are other entrants ranked not far behind. These include Norman Cook of Chicago, formerly of Portland, Ore. and former amateur star; Eddie Meyers, former long swimmer at Fort New York, and Ruth Tower, of Denver, who finished second to Martha Norrell in the women's 10-mile event last week. Miss Norrell herself will not compete although the first five finishers in the women's event automatically qualified for the open marathon. Two hundred and fifty-eight of the competitors were examined by the medical board yesterday and only two were rejected. Eight others did not pass but were to be given another chance today. The first entrant to be rejected was a one-legged man, Leonard Adams, of Seattle. Another competitor lacking one leg, Max Kuhlman, of Wisconsin, was passed. Possibly the heaviest man in the swim will be Edward D. Hoff, Venice, Calif., policeman. He weighs 280 pounds. His chest under normal conditions measures 50 inches around. He can expand it seven and one-half inches, a record among the competitors examined so far. Prize money aggregating \$25,000 will be distributed, \$25,000 going to the winner.

EAGLE POINT, Ore., Aug. 27.—(Special)—The rock crusher has been removed from Howland and is being put on the Pete Young gravel bed and about 4 1/2 miles of road leading through the Youngs properties is being gravelled. The railroad crossing will soon be completed as they are working on that now. The balance of the road men and machines have moved on to the Dean Indian road above Ashland.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—"They came at us like mad savages," a Jerusalem dispatch to the London Daily Express today quoted Ben Gordon, Jerusalem banker, as saying of the Arab Sabbath day attack on Jewish suburbs of Jerusalem. "At first we were not afraid," he said, "because we had evacuated all women and children from twelve adjoining dwellings to my house which was in the strongest position. But as darkness fell they came in great numbers flourishing revolvers and gas pistols. We had only three rifles and were running short of ammunition. One shot was shot in the hand. Then two young men were hit. Our position was just about hopeless and we were ready to give up when a detachment of British military volunteers came up. They lay on the ground and saved five and we were saved." A Jerusalem special correspondent of the Daily Express, said the Jewish population at Hebron was departing quietly in the Sabbath week when the Arab riotous suddenly descended on the little village. In one house out of a D. S. Simon, manager of the Arab-Postoffice bank, 15 persons were killed, including the manager, his wife, two children, and the parents of Mrs. Simon. Fifteen American students were among 24 Jewish dead.
