

COUNTY TURKEY POL PLANNED FOR SEPTEMBER

REGISTRATION FOR HIGH SCHOOL WILL START ON FRIDAY

Operative Manager Announces Early Preparation of Valley Birds to Meet High Class Demand - Varmints Vex.

Preparatory steps for the formation of a turkey pool in this valley will be taken by the Farm and Co-operative early in the fall. Manager Clay D. Parson said today. The first step will be the scientific feeding of turkeys, during the fattening period, which extends from September to November 1. Bulletins are issued to the turkey raisers from time to time.

One of the systematized methods is to produce firm, white meat. In great demand with Eastern buyers. A turkey ration consisting entirely of corn, produces low meat and turkey raisers have been advised to exercise caution in this point. Turkey and chicken raisers, throughout the valley, are having trouble with skunks and weasels. Varmints come out of their holes and raid the hen yards. One man recently had 50 chickens in one night by skunks. He killed six skunks in reprisal and is planning on trapping them now on.

Weasels are particularly numerous in the area along the hillsides of the Crater Lake highway. Turkey raisers report that they are more active, than in past years. In the local market, which continues until the hens start to lay next month. Standard egg prices are 45c a dozen, and 45c for 35c. This price is 10c to 15c higher than quotations. The Co-operative is experiencing difficulty in supplying the Klamath market. The supply does not meet the demand, with no cold storage. There is less than half a ton of cold storage eggs available. This is the lowest cold storage figure in many years. Manager Parson said.

There is also a brisk demand for Klamath county for chickens for various purposes, which can be filled, as only a few poultry of this city, raise chickens in the block.

VALLEY STUDENTS FREE LOCAL FRUIT

Pickett visited a number of the large fruit plants in this city before leaving for the north. They have been on a tour for a month, having visited Idaho, Utah, and California, during several days in Oregon, during which they will stop at various State colleges, they plan to visit through the eastern part of Oregon, visiting the Wenatchee and Yakima valleys, then return to Iowa. Professor Pickett was accompanied by Earl New of Manchester, Iowa; John Wingert of Ames; Frank Dendel of Kingsley, Iowa; Paulman Lee of Canton, Iowa; and David Tashbairn of Iowa.

Pupils in high school have been asked not to purchase their books until after they have registered and received their schedules for the semester.
