

LADY MARY HURT BY PLANE'S DIVE THRU MILL ROOF

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 29.—Lady Mary Heath, noted British aviatrix, was in a critical condition this afternoon from injuries received in a crash of an airplane on a factory roof here. She has a fractured skull, a broken nose and probably internal injuries.

Hospital attendants said her recovery is in doubt.

Lady Heath, accompanied by Erwin Kirk, a Cleveland mechanic, was practicing a dead stick landing at the time of the accident. She was planning to enter a contest of that nature at the national air races today.

With the motor of her plane shut off, Lady Heath was gliding toward a landing mark when the plane dropped unexpectedly toward the roof. She had no power to raise it out of danger.

The one wing of the plane hit a guy wire to a chimney on the factory and the machine crashed through the roof.

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—A coroner's jury has been named to investigate the shooting of Helmond Moore, eastern Oregon rancher, by his son, Glenn, near Hermiston Tuesday night, but the time of the inquest has not been established.

The jury will make a thorough study of the case in which the elder Moore was slain, before it reports its findings.

The 11-year-old boy was being held in the county jail today and District Attorney Probstel said the case would be handled through juvenile court.

GERMANS PAY MONEY FOR VESUVIUS 'LAVA'

HALLE, Germany.—(AP)—The recent eruption of Vesuvius inspired Karl Klemmangel to start a lava selling business.

Visiting the villages around Halle in the makeup of a wandering Italian whose wife and two children had been killed by the volcano and speaking very broken German, he offered, and found ready buyers for, pieces of lava, which he said he had broken from the masses that destroyed his home.

Business was flourishing until Klemmangel one day met a German who had lived in Italy. This German, addressing the peddler Italian in his native tongue, found to his surprise that the latter did not know a word of Italian. Klemmangel was arrested and his "lava" proved to be ordinary soft stone.

GOVERNOR HARTLEY LAUDS EDISON VICTOR

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Wilbur Huxon, winner of the Edison scholarship was commended to the president of the United States by Governor Hartley at a luncheon in honor of the Seattle boy given by the state department of education here yesterday.

"This boy stands as the president of the United States, alone," the governor said. "The one boy in the republic. Yes, he's the old man if you can. Good will of the people of the commonwealth goes with you."

OREGON STATE STUDENT IS TRAFFIC CASUALTY

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Robert Carruthers, 26, Astoria student at the Oregon State College, died here late last night from injuries suffered when the motorcycle he was riding crashed into an automobile, driven by R. M. Irvine, Portland salesman. The accident occurred between Astoria and Seaside.

An inquest was being held today. Carruthers died in a hospital here about four hours after the accident occurred.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Chambers of commerce at Medford, Eugene, Portland, Salem, Albany, Corvallis and other western cities were receiving invitations today to send delegations to the "golden spike" driving on the completed Southern Pacific Klamath Falls-Alturas cutoff at Hackamora September 14.

Klamath Falls will be represented by a special train of 200 persons, it was said.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Without arriving at any decision, the state highway commission met yesterday for a hearing on a petition for creation of a super road district. The proposed district is intended to provide funds for a short cut road reducing mileage between Portland and Tillamook by way of Yamhill.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Citizens of Eugene were hosts to Major General and Mrs. Creed C. Hammond last night at a large banquet. Major General Hammond and his wife will sail September 7 from Seattle for Manila where he will assume the post of insular advisor of the Philippines, the position to which he was recently appointed.

LOAN TEN CENTS PER BUSHEL FOR WHEAT FARM AID

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Immediate financial relief for grain farmers through loans by the federal farm board on unhedged grain which has already been used as collateral for loans from federal intermediate credit banks was the promise made today at the close of the grain marketing conference by Alexander Legge, chairman of the farm board.

Legge asserted that the board would loan 10 cents a bushel on such grain to members of farmers' cooperatives.

The meeting adjourned without adopting any definite plans for the proposed national grain marketing corporation.
