ZEPPELINEERS ACCLAIMED BY NEW YORK CITY

City Opens Gates to Intrepid Crew of Globe Balloon—Military Escort for Broadway Parade—Leeds Piloted Ship.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The city flung wide its gates today to welcome Commander Hugin Eklander, officers and crew of the German dirigible, Graf Zeppelin, their return from man's fastest trip around the world.

An official municipal welcome afforded an opportunity for the citizens of the metropolis to show themselves hospitable to the German aeronauts whose exploit has captured the imagination and admiration of the world.

Mr. Eklander yesterday paid his respects to President Hoover, and heard from the chief executive words of congratulation in behalf of the American people.

Military and naval units in the New York area and a detachment of the city police were called to form an escort to the automobile parade up Broadway in the city hall for formal greeting from Mayor Walter O'Sullivan.

William H. Lewis, son of the dirigible's passenger, described the thrill it gave him to take the steering wheel of the Graf for the first time over the Pacific.

"Of course it was a great thrill for me to stand there at the wheel and realize that I was steering the great dirigible at the time it was making such a wonderful record for itself," he said.

"I saw the world, but only four minutes since I left Lakehurst," he added.

MURDERER PAYS WITH LIFE AT SAN QUENTIN

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., Aug. 29.—(AP)—John H. Price, 41, was hanged in San Quentin prison today for the murder of his common-law wife in Los Angeles. The trap was sprung at 10:04 a. m. and he was pronounced dead 15 minutes later.

"I hope you do a better job than I did," were Price's last words. He had goodbyes to Wardens James J. Holahan just as the noose was being slipped over his head. Price refused all offers of spiritual consolation from the chaplains.

SELECT MEDFORD FOR LABOR MEET

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Medford was selected as the 1930 convention site for the Oregon State Federation of Labor by delegates attending the annual session here today.

William Cooper, Portland, was nominated for president for the third consecutive time. D. E. Nickerson and N. Prosser were nominated for vice president. Nickerson holds the position at present.

Ben T. Osborne was re-nominated secretary-treasurer and will be opposed for election by G. A. Von Schritze, Portland. All officers will be chosen by the general membership of local unions before December 15, to start October 1.

The convention ended today.

ASHLAND PEARS BRING GOOD PRICE

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(Special)—A carload of Bartlett pears has been shipped from Ashland to a northern cannery by the Ashland Fruit and Produce association and the carload was sold at 85¢ per ton, a decided increase over last year's crop that sold at 75¢ per ton.

A quantity of early peaches has also been sent by the local association. Just at the present time, however, the crop is being consumed by the markets in northern California and in Klamath county. Later varieties of peaches will be on the market in a week or ten days.

CANADIAN LAMB BRINGS \$2000

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A Canadian lamb which sold for \$2,000 held top price today in the national lamb sale. The ram, a Suffolk, was bought by Lullaw and Henkle of Madison, Wis. from J. M. Patrick & Son of Piddington, Ontario, and was imported recently from England.

The price has been equalled only once in the ram sales here during the past 14 years. Good Suffolk lambs were sold at \$1,000. Another lamb owned by Patrick & Son was sold to Lullaw and Henkle for \$1,750.

DISCUSS LOCATION OF WEED-KLAMATH ROAD

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—A bill to build a road from Weed to Klamath Falls was being discussed today after high way engineers and county officials met at the state highway department in Klamath Falls.

The bill would build a road from Weed to Klamath Falls, a distance of 100 miles. The road would be 12 feet wide and would be built on the right-of-way of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company.

I. C. COMMISSION GRANT S. P. LEASE LAKEVIEW ROUTE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The interstate commerce commission today authorized the acquisition by the Southern Pacific railway of the Nevada-California-Oregon railway line which extends 155 miles from Wendell, Lassen county, California, to Lakeview, Oregon. The commission already had authorized the Southern Pacific to purchase the capital stock of the other carrier.

Acquisition of the Nevada-California-Oregon railway line will provide a through route for Southern Pacific traffic between Klamath Falls, Oregon and Ogden, Utah. The commission said it estimated that an annual saving of \$25,000 would be gained by operation of the line by the Southern Pacific.
