A cover spray is advised as a means of checking the advance of the soiling moth, now at the peak of the second brood egg deposition, by B. G. Thompson, assistant entomologist of the Oregon experiment station. The spray should be applied before these eggs hatch, which will be in from 8 to 16 days depending upon weather conditions. The standard spray recommended by the experiment station is dry powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of two to three pounds to 100 gallons of spray solution. BRUSSELS (AP)—Successful experiments with headlights on airplanes to facilitate night landings have been made by Sabena, the Belgian air line, at the Baren airport in Brussels. A plane was equipped with a light which, reflected by a parabolic Phillips reflector, was projected 1,000 feet when the plane flew at an altitude of 300 feet. The success of the tests has prompted the Belgian government to provide all planes with such beacon facilities.

ARGUE GOLD HILL POWER RIGHT CASE U. S. COURT SOON

FIVE COURT CASES which have been argued through Oregon courts will be argued when the United States circuit court of appeals for the ninth district conducts sessions here during the week of September 15.

The appeal of the city of Gold Hill and the Beaver-Portland Cement company against the California-Oregon Power company to determine the extent of power site rights in the Rogue river adjacent to Gold Hill will be heard. Other appeals to be heard are: The appeal of A. E. Downing and others, convicted on charges of using the mails to defraud in connection with the promotion of stock sales in an alleged worthless silver mine.

The appeal of E. E. Whiteside, veteran of the World War, from an adverse decision in his suit to recover the benefits of a war risk insurance policy.

GENEVA (AP)—A report by the secretary of the League of Nations reveals that it has published 1850 treaties, in French and an original language. The parts are contained in 86 volumes of 450 pages each. The report shows that the United States communicated fourteen treaties in the past year.
