Home Decoration

 "When beauty is expressed in our surroundings it becomes a part of our life and our personality. It is not a thing to be set apart for occasional enjoyment, but should be sought in everything we do, and in everything we select."
 —Query—How much furniture should be used in a bedroom?
 —Mrs. F. D. E.

Answer—All depends upon the size of the room, the purpose which it is to use it and the type of furniture selected. For the average bedroom some kind of a stand or small table and at least one comfortable chair should be used with the usual three pieces.

Query—Do India prints make good wall hangings?—Mrs. W. I. W.
Answer—For an inexpensive hanging, nothing more delightful for it is a genuine India print, the texture, design and color harmony are all excellent and harmonize with the other furnishings of the room.

Query—Should cushioned curtains be lined?—Mrs. M. J. W.
Answer—It is not usual to do so, for there are so many grades of such fabric that one can select just the right one easily. But it is not incorrect to line them if it seems desirable.

Query—Are valences used now?—Mrs. S. T. W.
Answer—No, they are seldom used except when ceilings are very high and a strong horizontal line is desired. Valences are simple and are usually hung straight and arranged so that they can be drawn over the entire window.

Query—What pieces of furniture should be used in an entrance hall?—Answer—Some kind of a table or cabinet, one which is rather narrow is best, and a chair or two of interesting lines. It should be one with a high back which will give directly and height to the hall. A half oval table higher than the usual table is always good for a hall. Your entrance hall gives your guest his first impression of your personality and your home, so work it out carefully, keeping it simple and dignified.

'HAMLET' WILL BE GIVEN ON KMGD BY MR. GREENLEAF

William Lee Greenleaf, Shakespearean artist, who will be presenting the California Oregon Power company in its famous rendition of "Hamlet" Tuesday evening, over station KMGD, has given this play several hundred times. He has acted twenty-one of the greatest actors in Hamlet, the first of which was the immortal Edwin Booth. He has acted Hamlet when only 2 years old and when he has heard a record of other Hamlets since, he still has some recollection of the beauty and excellence of Edwin Booth's portrayal.
