HAGAN HERE TO LEAD MEDFORD HIGH ATHLETES

Ex-Oregon Star to Have Big Green Squad As Nucleus — First Practice Thursday — Team Picks Mascot—Marshfield Here Oct. 5.

Medford Hagan, former University of Oregon football star, newly named coach of the Medford high school—state champions and near champions for five years, under the guidance of Frank Callison, now freshman coach at the University of Oregon, will start training operations next Thursday, for the season. He will have the entire second team of last year, all grounded in football fundamentals, as a nucleus for the 1929 team, and a rugged array of material from the Junior high school. Hagan arrived Friday, and spent yesterday getting acquainted with his charges.

The team will be as heavy as last year's team, but green and inexperienced. They will also be a willing lot. Visiting squads seeking to be the first to defeat Medford, in what has been called "the year year," are assured of a busy and strenuous afternoon. Medford is not up to win any state championship, or to be any "Black Tornadoes" for a couple of years, but they will have plenty of resistance.

The team will play the annual game with the alumni, the last

Saturday in September, and next March in Medford. The Marshfield team played every game scheduled with Medford, the last five years, and its appearance will be featured as one of the big games of the year.

Klamath Falls, which has never defeated a Medford high football or basketball team in the history of athletic relations between the two schools, is coming this year, with a veteran team. They are predicted already the defeat of Medford. They will face the second team that defeated them last fall, 21 to 0.

Grants Pass, after being dormant for three years, has been scheduled with a team and has a game scheduled. The Chemawa Indians, Corvallis, Eugene, and Astoria, will play here.

Among the local players will be Jimmy Metz, guard, 165 pounds; Ross Green, 175, guard; John Sprague, 170, halfback; Orelle Newlin and Charles Clay, 150, fullbacks; and quarterback Charles Thomas, end, Mason, 175 pounds, center; Castleman, 175 pounds, tackle.

Bill Cunningham, Zamboni and Cave, junior high stars, with weight and speed, are among the new material.

Marshall Hickman, a 14-year-old colored boy, a freshman, has been named the mascot and water boy for the team.

Suits will be distributed Wednesday afternoon and the first workout will be held Thursday evening after school.

Coach Hagan had nothing to say about the team or his plans. "Football games are played on the football field," he said.

Hagan, a strict disciplinarian, will have more strict training rules than those employed by Callison and will insist on their observance.

RUSSIAN CROWN JEWEL, HAWKED IN SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Aug. 31.—According to well authenticated gossip in Shanghai's Russian circle, one of the crown jewels of the Russian empire, a diamond brooch, is being peddled from shop to shop here by a Soviet agent. Owing to its great value, no purchaser has been found.

The major stone, a diamond of ten carats, is valued at \$250,000 and the entire piece without reference to its intrinsic value should be worth not less than half a million. The agent is said to have offered the big diamond for less than \$100,000, but even at this price there have been no takers.

Judging from reports, the agent has been in Shanghai for several months, arriving here from Harbin.

WIND AT PEBBLE BEACH HANDICAP FOR BOBBY'S PLAY

PEBBLE BEACH, CALIF., Aug. 31.—(AP) Falling considerably short of his record breaking 67 of the day before, Bobby Jones wound up his week of practice for the national amateur golf championship today by shooting a 74, four over par. The titleholder's practice round was a miss and he picked up on the one hole, the eighth, after firing an iron shot over the sandy beach.

Jones, playing in a foursome with the Englishman, T. A. Broom and his partner, against Eugene Hannan of England, N. J., and Phillips of Maryland, took a 25 and 23 and back in the same round. It was the worst practice round by far that the Georgian has played since coming to California, but the gallery of more than 1,000 that followed him got the impression he was not exerting himself.

The match was played in a brisk wind, conditions not so favorable as yesterday. This, along with a slight slip on his second shot to the eighth green, contributed to an approximate score for the champion. His ball went over the sharp drop to the right of the green, into sand, and he picked up after failing in to attempt to get out.

WOULD USE SEAPLANES IN SOUTH SEA TRADE

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 31.—An effort to substitute seaplanes and freight carrying seaplanes for steamships on some of the inter-island routes is being made by W. O. Smith, general manager of the Commonwealth Transport Co.

A seaplane, Mr. Smith says, would be invaluable for freight between the trading posts in the South Sea and the islands, which
