

OREGON EXHIBIT HOME BREW ON IS ATTRACTION PICNIC RESULTS IN SACRAMENTO IN FATAL CRASH

Diamond Jubilee Visitors Throng About Oregon Products Arranged By D. M. Lowe of Medford—Fish and Game Shown.

Portland Woman and a Boy Killed, Husband and Son Injured When Car Leaves Highway—Many Bottles Found in Wreck.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 2.—(Special)—The names of hundreds of visitors to the Diamond Jubilee, California State fair and Western States Exposition from Oregon already had been inscribed today on the register at the pretentious exhibit of the state of Oregon.

Located in the center of the Western States building on the fair grounds here, the Oregon booth dominates the entire floor. Three phases of the state's wealth are stressed in three separate departments.

The first is agriculture. In a booth presided over by D. M. Lowe, of Medford, this booth is decorated with a canopy of flax, clover, alfalfa and field grain. Within is an array of ripe products in all their luscious colors, arranged in futuristic patterns.

There is a marked differentiation between the Oregon products shown and the ones to be seen in the booths prepared by California counties. The fruit, for one thing, is delicious and more varied than the citrus displays.

Native Sons Too Short

Several California natives have attempted to win the Golden State who is as tall as a school of salmon grown in the Rogue River valley. None so far has measured the necessary 7 feet 8 inches, even with the high-heeled boots worn by giants of the range country.

Just back of the agricultural booth is a similar sized place which has attracted hundreds of questions before have seen flax in any but its finished state.

Here is shown the tall flax as it is reaped from the field and whipped out raw product and the other stages before the fine linen stage is reached.

The booth is in charge of E. J. Githright of Salem, Ore., owner of the Miles-Linen company, manufacturers of linen threads and linens.

The counter surrounding the booth is decorated with salmon fish nets and the 25 products of the flax, from the seed, paper board from the stock and food from the pods are shown.

Minerals Displayed

A mineral display of 61 ores mined in Oregon has attracted the attention of Californians who pride themselves on the mining industry of their home state.

Perhaps the most sustained interest, however, is shown in the fish and game exhibit of wild life native to the northwest.

Twenty-two separate varieties of placemats hop about the cool green interior of the miniature zoo. There are six species of quail, including the mysterious Chinese quail whose antecedents have puzzled biologists in all parts of the world.

Wild turkeys gobble distractedly as visitors pet them with popcorn and peanuts.

A little tabernacle with a canopy native Californians to gaze at the exhibition of high treason was erected early the first day of the fair. A pretty woman with three small children in their Sunday best fingered, eating hungrily at the displays of Oregon fruits.

But at the flax booth, she had stood all day. She asked for a reasonable time and showed a fairly good cream-line on the flax. It is not very likely that any further examination will be demanded by the consumer. A further investigation, however, into its history and composition might show it to be a very poor quality of food product and in extreme cases totally unfit for human consumption.

DOLORES' KISSES HEARD IN TALKIE MADONNA OF AVE.



Even the parrot talks distinctly in the "Madonna of Avenue A," the talking moving picture featuring the charming Dolores Costello with Grant Withers as her leading man, which stands out conspicuously as one of the very best of talking films, not only in its dialogue and other features, but in its acting and direction. The kisses exchanged by the lovers can be heard in the "Madonna of Avenue A," which opened at Hunt's Criterion theater yesterday to run afternoon and night until Wednesday, lived up to its advance notices, and is a gripping drama of unusual plot, thrills and intense interest, filled with much action, many surprises and much heart appeal.

It is unusual to another way in that the beautiful Dolores this time enacts the part of a lonely and exquisitely innocent boarding school girl, whose mother she thinks is a big society woman, but in reality is the operator of a notorious night club with a notorious gambling joint in connection, and in her effort to escape this loneliness falls in love with a young run-around and hoodleg.

Her mother's exposure follows, he daughter is ensnared in the night club life and marries the hoodleg, and the repentant mother, in attempting to free her daughter's happiness commits suicide in the belief that by so doing her \$10,000 life insurance policy will keep the daughter's husband out of prison.

The story is laid in world surroundings, no one is killed and there is little villainy, but nevertheless the absorbed audience does not breathe freely until the daughter emerges from the evil environment, still a good woman.

Louise Dressler, that stellar actress, and Grant Withers as the lover and husband, among the large cast are especially good in their acting and talking. Miss Costello appears in almost the entire picture in a bathing beauty scene, and in addition sings a song and plays a song organ, while Grant Withers sings and plays his own accompaniment with guitar or mandolin.

The "Madonna of Avenue A" is well worth seeing—worth a trip to the theater.

The comedy of the bill is furnished by the well known comedienne Ben Turpin, who personally conducts the audience to the studios and other points of interest about Hollywood, including May McAvoy's church wedding, and as the notable film star's wedding guests come out of the church introduce each other with a few words of acknowledgment.

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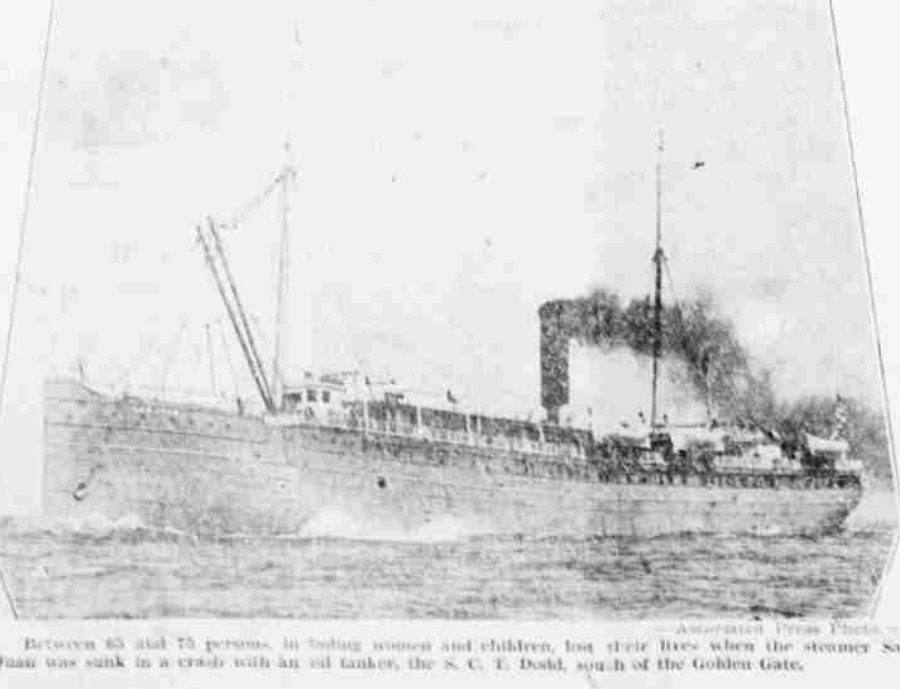
MADISON, Va., Sept. 2.—(Special)—President Hoover has decided to initiate a move looking to the education of the mountain children living in the sparsely settled region surrounding his fishing camp on the head waters of the Rapidan river in Virginia.

The chief executive personally is to head a committee which will raise funds to build a little school house in the mountain region. He also has undertaken the formation of a local committee to confer with Virginia state authorities over obtaining a teacher for the school.
