

ALCORN TO HAVE PROHIBITION PORTFOLIO

State's Attorney of Connecticut Decided Upon As Successor to Mrs. Willebrandt—Some Opposition in Senate Reported—Announcement Is Delayed—Few Rejected.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—(Special)—The selection of an assistant attorney general to succeed Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt as chief prohibition enforcement officer, President Hoover has completed, reorganization of the administration of which he became the head six months ago.

He still has a number of judicial appointments as well as some others to make, however, the judicial including judges for the first and seventh circuits and for the eastern district of New York and the districts of Kansas and New Jersey. In addition two judges must be selected for the court of appeals.

District attorneys still to be appointed include those for the southern district of Florida, the northern district of Mississippi and the eastern and western districts of Pennsylvania. These will complete the reorganization of the district attorneys' force of the country as a result of a survey determined upon by the chief executive and Attorney General Mitchell early in the administration.

With these selections there will be a sizeable batch of appointments to be acted upon by the senate, including one hundred and seventeen submitted at the first part of the special session of congress, but which were not acted upon. All of these nominations must be sent in again.

Anti Nominations
President Hoover probably will defer to the wishes of republican senate leaders that only the most important nominations be submitted before the regular session in December so that there will be a minimum of interference with the consideration of the tariff bill.

Nominations of the eight members of the federal farm board unquestionably will be transmitted to the senate soon after the resumption of the special session this week as members of the board must serve without compensation until their nominations have been confirmed.

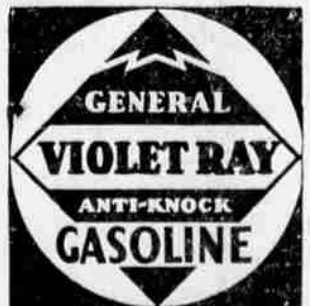
Just before the special session ends the president also is expected to submit the name of Senator Walter E. Edge, of New Jersey, to be ambassador to France.

There naturally is speculation as to whether Mrs. Willebrandt's successor will be nominated before December. The president has practically decided to appoint Hugh M. Alcorn, state's attorney of Connecticut. Mr. Alcorn has the endorsement of most of the dry leaders, but there have been reports of some opposition in the senate and it is assumed to have delayed announcement of the appointment.

May Defer Naming Young
The nomination of Clarence M. Young, of Iowa, as assistant secretary of commerce for aviation may be held over until the regular session as William P. MacCracken does not retire until October 1. It may also be that some of the judicial nominations will be held over, especially those around which any controversy might develop.

Thus far the president has had little difficulty with the senate over nominations, having had only one rejected out of a total of 1,948 submitted. Four of the nominations, all involving promotion of army officers, were withdrawn and 1,826 were confirmed with 117 still to be acted upon. The nomination rejected was that of Richmond A. Bolton, as postmaster at Jamestown, N. D.
