

H.D'AUTREMONT IS WORKING IN LAUNDRY AT PEN

Wm. A. Gates, Foreman of Jury That Convicted Desperado, Chats With Prisoner—Has Cheerful Philosophy, Is Report.

Hugh D'Autremont, serving a life sentence at the state prison at Salem for his confessed part in the Siskiyon Tunnel attempted holdup and quadruple murders, is working in the prison laundry, according to William A. Gates, who visited an hour with him yesterday. Gates was foreman of the grand jury that returned indictments against him and his twin brothers, and it was his first meeting with the notorious desperado.

He said that since meeting out life terms to the D'Autremonts for their crime it is impossible to induce a jury to turn a hanking verdict in this state as the D'Autremont case is a caution for justice. A juror, the prison officials told, is loathe to vote for the death penalty with the D'Autremont case fresh in his memory.

Adjustment Hard
"It don't make much difference whether you are inside or outside," Hugh told Gates. "After a few years this is home. We have our worries, and so does the free man. It all even up. The rule is becoming adjusted to prison life."

"You will remember that I came down the Siskiyon in the car and hit a steer near Ashland. The car turned around two or three times. It could have turned over and broke my leg or arm or back. I would have thought that tough luck. Now I know an accident would have been good luck. It would have changed the entire course of my life."

The superintendent of the prison said Hugh was a model prisoner, but the most puzzling one under his charge, whose mood was a source of study. Hugh has been granted an hour a day for reading in the yard. During these periods he was studied, through opera glasses, by the prison criminologists.

The twins are working in the prison flax mill. Their wage of 25 cents a day is diverted to the support of Ray's wife and two children.

HOLD WITNESS IN PROTECTION SCANDAL LOS A.

Secret Indictment Returned Against Self-Confessed Bootlegger—Measure of Protection—Grand Jury Continues Probe

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Grand jury indictments against certain police officers charged with exacting tribute in return for protection in the sale of liquor appeared more certain today as the group continued its hearing of witnesses in connection with statements made by J. D. Westman, alias Harry D. McDonald, self-confessed bootlegger.

Before the special session of the jury adjourned yesterday, Westman and three others were named in secret indictments charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws. It was said by Deputy district attorneys that the true bill returned against Westman would serve to hold him in jail as a protective measure against possible attack on his life.

FATE OF FIVE IN MINE IS UNKNOWN

STOCKTON, Calif., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Somewhere in the depths of the Calaveras copper mine at Copperopolis today five miners were entombed under a hundred tons of rock and dirt that slid upon them yesterday in a thunderous cataract that is thought to have crushed the life out of at least four. The fifth man, Joe Mendez, a Mexican, was believed still alive early today. Numerous slides hampered rescue.

A sixth man, Ompré Valle, was rescued and today was in a hospital here. The men were trapped at the 1550 foot level of the mine while ascending the shaft. Two mine foremen, riding to the surface in a hoist, escaped the caving and gave an alarm.

CHICAGO GANGS ARE BLAMED IN DUAL SLAYING

Fifth Outbreak in Week Accounts for West Side Hoodlum and Companion—Bodies Found in Park With Many Wounds.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 4.—(AP)—A double murder, the fifth outbreak of gang wars in Chicago within a week, was committed early today in the park shadows of Jacob Rits park, Fullerton and Narragansett avenues.

One of the victims was a well-known West Side hoodlum, bomber, terror and "muscle man." He was Cy Cawley.
The other, unknown to police, was identified after considerable confusion as Eddie Westcott.
The bodies, bearing dozens of wounds, were found on a strip of lawn bordering the park. Automatic pistols and sawed-off shotguns had been fired at close range.
Westcott was first identified as Willie McElligott, brother of Thos. McElligott, who had been one of Cawley's pals in the garage racket. Thomas McElligott was found murdered in a West Madison avenue cafe early last May 30.
Two women identified Westcott's body. One, Marie Casey, said she had known him for several years.

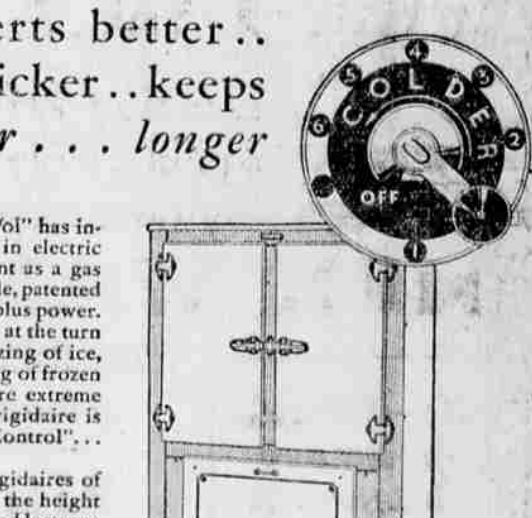
