

CITY BANKS VICTIMS OF BUNGO MEN

Six Institutions Contribute Total of \$450,000 to Slick Pair — Telegrams Sent From Denver, Gain Deposit of Large Sums — Cashiers' Checks Used Claim Booty.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 5.—(AP)—A pair of bango men, one working in Denver and the other in New York, obtained six New York City banks out of \$450,000 last Saturday, police were advised today.

The six New York banks were correspondents of a like number of Denver banks. Each of the New York institutions contributed \$75,000 to the scheme of the extortionists.

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Police officers here today have been requested to help find a man who said he was A. A. Wagoner, bank president of Tennessee, Colorado, who is charged with having flooded the Harriman National bank out of \$75,000 by using a fake telegram in bankers' code and presumably forged cashier's check.

A week ago the Harriman bank received a fake telegram, supposedly from the American National National bank of Denver asking for the transfer of \$100,000 from the Harriman bank to the credit of the Telluride Bank of Colorado. In the Wall Street branch of the Chase National bank.

The money was placed on deposit there and subsequently a man who said he was Wagoner, appeared with a cashier's check and drew the money out. The Harriman bank learned yesterday that the telegram was not sent by the Denver bank.

OPPOSING VIEWS AIRED ON TARIFF BY REPUBLICANS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Opposing views on the pending tariff bill were expressed to President Hoover today by Governor John S. Fisher of Pennsylvania and Representative Johnson of Washington, both Republicans.

Governor Fisher said the tariff bill would benefit both agriculture and industry and that Representative Johnson declared he had told the president the tariff bill as it now stands was nothing but a "sting lead, pig iron measure."

He explained he means by this that the tariff bill gave inadequate protection to agriculture and more than the needed protection to industry. The substantial feature of the tariff bill, Governor Fisher said, is the "change of the approach for fixing rates on imports from foreign to domestic valuation."

URGE HOLY WAR IN PROPAGANDA AMONG TRIBES

Moslems Throughout Holy Land Called Upon to Rise Against Government—Jerusalem Quiet — Minor Border Clashes.

JERUSALEM, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Moslem Arabs throughout the Holy land and in the neighboring states are being called upon to fight inflammatory propaganda to arouse and move against the government of Palestine.

Friends of the propaganda material were said here today to have emanated from Jaffa, Haifa, Egypt, Damascus, Beirut, and Aleppo, and have been distributed in the surrounding of renewed discontent.

One of the proclamations in circulation among the Arabs bore a "Fighting Holy War" and called upon all Arabs to help Arab insurgents in Palestine, whose condition was described in the blackest terms.

Although Jerusalem was quiet today, British troops continued their incessant clashes with bands of tribesmen who have penetrated the Palestine borders. One automobile, which yesterday attempted to cross Agency bridges from trans-Jordan to Palestine, was found to contain 14 rifles and 1000 rounds of ammunition.

LAWYERS TOLD TO MAKE HASTE PANTAGES CASE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 5.—(AP)—The defense and prosecution in the second degree murder trial of Mrs. Alexander Pantages were admonished by the court today to speed their efforts in the selection of a jury as attempts to obtain a panel entered the third day.

Rehearsing the lawyers for "technical squabbles," Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy told them that both sides have tried to give the law to this jury, and I feel they are going too far afield and wasting a lot of time. Seventy-two prospective jurors already had been examined.

Questioning of the second panel of 57 gentlemen began with each side fortified with only 10 remaining peremptory challenges.

Mrs. Pantages, who is alleged to have been responsible for the death of her husband, a Japanese, in an automobile collision last June 15 in which she was driving one of the machines, entered the courtroom on the arm of a nurse and it was apparent she was in a weakened condition.

PEBBLE BEACH, Cal., Sept. 5.—(AP)—The national amateur golf championship, minus the champion, Bobby Jones, went into the quarter-finals today with the "last night" meeting in four 36-hole matches.

One apparently to the elimination of Jones, a first-round victim for the first time, the smallest gallery of the week was on hand.

Sweetser and Egan were square at the third hole, each with one under par as a result of birdies on the third. Sweetser sank a five-foot putt for his birdie three while Egan holed out from a 15-foot lie.

Egan and Sweetser were square at the sixth, Egan took the fourth with a birdie while Sweetser was in trouble at the start with his drive into a trap and his second short taking five. They halved the fifth in par three and Sweetser evened the match on the sixth with a par, while Egan went one over par. Egan's drive was out of bounds and his second hit a tree and bounced out. Egan conceded the hole when his pitch was far short of the pin.

Gets 15-Foot Putt

Egan sank a 15-foot putt to take the seventh with a birdie, two. They halved the eighth in par fours after Sweetser made a great recovery from a trap. Egan missed a birdie when his putt rimmed the cup. Sweetser was in the trap again on the ninth, while Egan overbore the cup on his pitch shot. Both two-putted, Sweetser taking an extra stroke to go two down to Egan, who holed out in par.

Sweetser was three down at the 12th. They halved the 10th. On the 11th Egan holed out in par, while Sweetser was in a trap on his second and missed a 10-foot putt for a half. Both were in a trap on the 12th on their tee shots. Sweetser missed a putt and Egan's missed himself behind Sweetser, but shipped over his opponent's ball and holed out in four to half the hole.

3 Up at 15th.

Egan was three up at the 15th, after winning the 13th in par 4 and halving the next two. Sweetser was in a trap on his second on the 13th. He recovered nicely, but required two putts, both were in difficulty on the 14th, Egan at the start when he drove out of bounds. Sweetser was short on his second and over on his third and in hard luck when his Edin bounced out of the cup and forced him to take six, one over par. They halved the 15th in par 4's.

Egan picked up two more holes on the final three of the round. He won the 16th with par 4, missing a birdie, but thereby tying Sweetser, who tried to ship over, but missed the cup and took a 5. They halved the 17th in four, one over par, both requiring two putts after being in the trap. Egan bagged a birdie four on the 18th yard 15th by sinking an eight-foot putt after getting on in three. Sweetser was on in three and took two putts for par.

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Like the holes he left his punch in the gymnasium, it now seems that the great rubber Jones, after pointing all the way across the Rockies to show the boys out here how he does it, left his pay-per-minute name in the practice rounds. Unquestionably he's his best form. Jones was victorious yesterday in the first round of the national amateur golf championship by the 14-10 hole "Tina matches" raised havoc

with the first tournament ever held in the far west.

Johnny Goodman, 18-year-old Omaha, Neb., star, accomplished the downfall of the national open and four-time amateur title holder by the narrow margin of 1 up in a match decided on the home hole, but actually teed away by the defending champion on the 14th. Goodman in turn, was knocked out of the tournament in the second round by another plant-killer, 18-year-old William Lawson Little Jr., of San Francisco, for the day, at least, the youngster enjoyed the pure thrill of fairly leading the world's most renowned exponent of the royal and ancient game.

The outcome of the hectic first two rounds of match play left eight players—three from the far west, three from the east, one each from the mid-west and England, to battle it out today in the 36-hole quarter finals. In this free-for-all scramble for the crown led by Jones, these contestants were paired today as follows:

Today's Pairings

Civil Taylor, British champion, vs. Dr. O. P. Willing, Portland, Ore.; Jack Sweetser, New York, vs. Chandler Egan of Medford, Ore.; George Volant, New York, vs. Harrison Johnston, St. Paul, Minn.; and William Lawson Little Jr., San Francisco.

They were to play 18 holes, starting at 9 a. m., with 10-minute intervals, and another 18, at 1 p. m., beginning at 2 p. m.

Taylor not only established himself as an outstanding contender with two one-sided victories, the first over Eddie Held by 7 to 5 and the other over Fay Coleman by 3 and 2, but hung up a record-breaking 21 for the first time, three under par in the 36-hole round.

Surprisingly less brilliant was Geo. Volant, who whittled one Portland, Ore. favorite, Vincent Doin, in the first round by 4 and 2 and then another, Don Moss, the western champion, in the afternoon by 2 and 1. The New Yorker went out in 34 against Moss, whose par golf left him two down. "Jimmy" Johnston and Joe Sweetser had close calls in the first round, where each was carried an extra hole, but breezed through the second round. Johnston whipping Roland MacKenzie, 5 and 2, while Sweetser disposed of Johnny Lehmann, former Big Ten champion, and Chandler Egan, making a big comeback, took Van Kline's scalp, 2 and 1, and then eliminated a fellow Oregonian, Rudy Wilhelm, 7 and 2. Johnston won from Dave Martin of California, 4 and 2, then from T. A. Bourn, 5 and 2, having Clarence Hubby of Texas, 4 and trouble beating the 15-year-old 2 Dr. Willing, the battling den-Los Angeles star, Danny Saracini, won from the Englishman, 10 and 1.

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
