

# LUCKLESS OAKS AID HOLLYWOOD PENNANT HOPES

Stars Take Second Game at Emeryville, 6 to 4—Seals Larrup Ducks—Suhr Features With Bat, Gets Five Safeties.

By the Associated Press. Hollywood was further ahead of the Pacific Coast league pack today, with pennant chances shining brightly for Oscar Vitt's boys. As a result of the second triumph this week of the southerners over the luckless Oakland Oaks.

The southern team defeated the Oaks at Emeryville yesterday by a score of 6 to 4. A ninth inning rally at the expense of Jeffcoat brought victory to the stars. Jeffcoat had replaced Lou McEvoy and immediately found himself in trouble. Shellenbach pitched for Hollywood, and shelled the Acorns with fast ones that gave them only nine hits.

San Francisco's Seals defeated the Portland Ducks, who ended the last series in the north in first place, but today occupied third. The game at Recreation park ended 12 to 11. It was a great day for Gusie Suhr, the famous Coast league slugger. He drove in six runs on five hits, two of them homers.

Los Angeles defeated a makeshift Seattle team at Wrigley field, Los Angeles, by a 9 to 4 score. Because most of the Indian regulars missed a train at Portland, Manager Ernie Johnson threw in a substitute line-up. Clyde Barfoot and George Pipgras pitched nine innings of scoreless ball. However, the Indians broke the spell by scoring one in the sixth. Earl Webb and Ray Jacobs hit for the circuit for the southern team.

The Mission Reds and the Sacramento Senators struggled through an eleven inning contest in the California capital. It was a pitchers' battle that finally ended 4 to 3 in favor of the Missions. Heri McQuaid trimmed "Pudgy" Gould to take the margin with his second work. Flynn was pulled out in the third by the Senators and after that Gould and McQuaid fought to a finish.

## BRUINS REQUIRE 14 VICTORIES TO CLINGH PENNANT

Even though the Cubs won only one of their games against the Cardinals at St. Louis yesterday, Joseph McCarthy advanced the notches nearer a mathematical stranglehold upon the National league championship. The Pirates were considerable enough to permit the Reds to carry off with a 2 to 4 decision in Cincinnati, leaving the Bruins in need of just 13 victories to win, even if the Buccaneers should sweep the rest of their schedule.

The Cubs missed a chance to score a double victory in St. Louis only through a six-run explosion personally engineered by young Kenneth Penner in the sixth inning of the first game. Penner had followed Bush and Neft into the box, and was in possession of an 8 to 8 tie when the Cardinals came to bat in the eighth to pound out a 14 to 5 decision. The Cubs won the nightcap by 8 to 3.

The Robins made off with both decisions in a double-header at Baker bowl with the Phillies by scores of 4 to 3 and 3 to 7, the second a 10-inning slugfest.

The double triumph gave the Robins a lead of two and one-half games over the Phils for the top place in the second division.

Larry Benton's pass to George Sider with the bases full of Giants at the Polo grounds after Melvin Ott's homer had tied the score in the ninth.

Ray Kopp rushed to the aid of Eddie Rixey in the Pirates game at Cincinnati and got credit for the victory. The race for third place in the American league remained close, with Cleveland one and one-half games ahead of St. Louis. Wesley Ferrell pitched the Indians to a 7 to 2 victory over the Tigers, and Johnny Oden brought the Browns home ahead of the White Sox by the same score.

The Red Sox closed their series at home against Washington with a 5 to 1 victory.

## GOLDEN BEARS IN OPTIMISTIC MOOD AS SEASON OPENS

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 5.—(9)—Back up at the top again after a football famine that saw them driven to the depths of defeat and disappointment, California's golden bears this season begin their gridiron tasks with early prospects of being powerful contenders for both coast conference and inter-sectional honors.

Little, if any change in California's football fundamentals—a strong defensive system—is expected. For the past eight years the teams have been coached to kick and wait for the breaks. Those close to Coach C. M. "Biggie" Price, however, believe he will try this season to develop a faster and more thorough offense, chiefly because of the new rule which makes a fumble dead when recovered by the defense.

A tough coast schedule is made considerably more difficult because of an inter-sectional game with Pennsylvania in mid-season. After meeting St. Mary's, Santa Clara and Washington State on successive week-ends, the Bears will journey to Philadelphia for a contest with the Quaker eleven, October 19. It will be the first time a coast football team has played a game on the Atlantic seaboard in mid-season.
