EGAN GOES OFF GAME, IS BEATEN

Dr. Willing Takes Big Lead On First 18 of Semi-Final Play—Harrison Johnston Four Up On Veteran Outmet at Turn—Egan's Game Suffers Bad Reverse Today.

PEBBLE BEACH, Cal., Sept. 6.—(AP)—In two matches that were unexpectedly one-sided, Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, Ore., took an overwhelming lead of eight up on H. Chandler Egan, veteran champion of 25 years ago, while Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnston of St.



Paul gained a margin of four up on Francis Outmet of Boston, 1914 titleholder, today in the semi-finals of the national amateur golf championship.

Egan, whose comeback up to today had been one of the tournament's biggest sensations, was buried by the brilliance of Dr. Willing, who was five up at the turn, and after losing the twelfth captured four of the last six holes.

Johnston was four up on Outmet at the turn and six up at the 11th. But just as it began to look like a complete rout, the Bostonian rallied, winning two of the last four holes to cut down the margin of the St. Paul star.

On the first hole Egan missed the green with his second shot, overplayed his third and caught a trap when he came back, finally getting on in five and conceding the hole to Willing, who was on nicely in two.

Both were short of the green with their second shots at the second hole but got on and halved in par fives. A fine recovery to the green on his third shot enabled Egan to halve the third in par four.

Willing lagged the fourth and fifth in pairs when Egan took an extra hole on each and they halved the sixth to leave Willing three up. On the fourth both were on with their second shots and both missed first putts. After missing his second putt, Egan conceded the hole.

On the short fifth Willing was on the green to the left of the pin, his second was past the cup and he sank a short third for par 3. Egan teed into a trap to the right of the green, the ball burying itself in the wet sand. He was too strong chipping out, raised a long putt and conceded the hole.

The sixth was halved in birdie fours despite their short drives. Willing's second was a beautiful long, low shot to within forty yards of the green. His fifty approach laid him only four inches from the pin for an easy birdie. Egan missed his second and it just fell short of the green. He made a beautiful recovery to within ten feet of the cup and sank the long one to half the hole.

On the seventh Egan's tee shot found a trap and Willing won the hole in par 3. They halved the eighth in fives. Egan missing a 2-foot putt for a win.

Eckener Admits Being Lost Over North Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the Graf Zeppelin on its history-making round-the-world flight, was "lost" when he described a huge circle over northern Oklahoma on the way to Lakehurst, N. J., from Los Angeles. He told W. R. Estes, general manager of the state chamber of commerce in a letter Estes has made public.

CHANGE IN COVENANT IS SOUGHT

League of Nations Lacking in Means to Prevent War—British Introduce Resolution in Geneva Session for Revision to Square Covenant With Kellogg Pact.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The covenant of the League of Nations, inspired by Woodrow Wilson, has already been found lacking in effective means to prevent war by the statesmen taking part in the league's tenth assembly session.

Taking a bold and progressive step to make the covenant at least as strong as the Kellogg renunciation of war pact, the British labor government today introduced a resolution calling for revision of the league covenant so that henceforth war may be really banished, as under the Kellogg pact.

The resolution was introduced by Foreign Secretary Henderson of Great Britain and was made in behalf also of France, Italy, Belgium, Chile and Denmark.

The British government regards the adoption of the principle of obligatory arbitration of supreme importance in the movement to attain real international security, declared Foreign Secretary Henderson of Great Britain before the league today.

Because of the probably great destructive effect of another war England is determined to press forward the work of disarmament on land, sea and air.

The British foreign secretary proposed that financial assistance be given to any nation which may be the victim of an aggressor nation in war and hoped a convention to this effect might be drawn up during the present assembly session.

If this were done, Mr. Henderson pledged Great Britain to "sign this treaty on the spot."

MANILA WATER SUPPLY FAILS DURING STORM

MANILA, Sept. 6.—(AP)—An acute water shortage, occasioning a number of disorders, developed in Manila today when service from the regular mains, impaired by the recent typhoon, ceased.

This left the city with only 29 artesian wells from which to draw water. The wells were wholly inadequate and long lines of residents carrying all sorts of containers flocked to them throughout the day.

Among the disorders was the serious standing of one man. The water main from Montalban, which was broken during the typhoon, still was unrepaired. An emergency flume was built from Nova Liches dam, 12 miles north of the city and through this the authorities hoped to restore the supply tomorrow.

An official death list today contained the names of 73 persons who perished in the typhoon. Heavily figured showed 19 dead in Albay province; 26 in Bulacan, three in Camarines Sur; 11 in Laguna and seven in Rizal.

LAD SUICIDES RATHER THAN GO TO SCHOOL

LOUIS VERDIN, 16, of Portland Backs Up Refusal to Attend Classes By Death Shot—'Gone for Good' Says Farewell Note

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Louis Verdin, 16, shot and killed himself at his home here today after writing a note to his mother telling her he chose death rather than go to school.

Deputy sheriff investigating the case learned that Louis had objected strenuously to going to school and that this morning he had refused to get up.

Lying back in bed at 8:15 a. m., after writing a note of defiance, he adjusted a curtain rod against the trigger of a shotgun, held the muzzle to his face, pushed the trigger and literally blew his head off.

His father was absent from home at the time, at work in a lumber camp near Bridal Veil.

The note, addressed to "Dear Mother," was replete with vulgarities and unprintable phrases. "I am gone for good," it said, "so burn everything I got and forget about me for good. Tell dad goodbye. I said I wasn't going to school, so that's that."

'WE' FLY TO HUNT LOST T.A.T. PLANE

Col. Lindbergh and Bride Take Air at Roosevelt Field in Borrowed Plane to Join Hunt in Arizona—Asks Associated Press Regarding Report Plane Found.

EL PASO, Sept. 6.—(AP)—An unconfirmed rumor reached here today that the missing Transcontinental Air Transport liner City of San Francisco was down near Hachita, N. M. An airplane was dispatched from here to investigate.

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, technical director of the Transcontinental Air Transport, borrowed a fast plane today to join the search for the T. A. T.'s missing plane the City of San Francisco.

Just as Colonel Lindbergh reached this field, where his borrowed plane was waiting ready for a take-off, he was informed of a report from Winslow, Ariz., that four men had been sighted from the air walking across the desert 100 miles north of Winslow.

He immediately called the Associated Press in New York and asked to have the dispatch from Winslow read to him. He then said that he would leave immediately to join the search, stopping at Columbus on the way to see if by that time the eight persons who disappeared with the transport plane last Tuesday had been found. He asked the Associated Press if they would have a man at Columbus to give him the latest information so that he would know whether to hurry on or to turn back in case the search should be ended.

Colonel Lindbergh was accompanied to the field by his wife and at the last minute revealed that he was going along with him. He had brought with him two parachutes taken from his own plane at the Newark airport.

Shooting into the air, Colonel Lindbergh banked the plane, circled around and crossed back over the airport, motor going full speed on a direct line for Columbus, O.

Two parachutes, complete camping equipment and several canisters filled with water were put into the plane before the start.

It was estimated that there were 500 gallons of gasoline in the extra large tanks.

WINSLOW, Ariz., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Lieutenant D. W. Tomlinson, former navy flying ace and chief pilot of the Maddux Air Lines, returned here at 10:42 a. m. today after a search of the desert and reported he saw four men on the wastes near Walpi, Ariz., who waved their shirts at him in a distress signal and that he replied.

After signaling to the men that he had seen them, Tomlinson returned to Winslow and other ships were immediately dispatched to the scene.

Walpi is on a high mesa about one hundred miles north of Winslow.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Transcontinental Air Transport officials here expressed doubt over the Winslow reports, and said they regarded it merely as another rumor, had received no reports from Lieutenant Tomlinson and further if any one were seen in the Walpi region probably it was Indians. There was no information to give out they said.

MAY POSTPONE DEER HUNTING STATE FORESTS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Because of the extremely dry condition of Oregon forests there is again a possibility that Governor Patterson may issue a proclamation delaying the opening of the deer shooting season. He so stated yesterday after receipt of a letter from E. A. Elliott, state forester. The season would open normally September 15.

Elliott's letter declared that weather conditions from July 1 to the last of August were such as to make the fire hazard in the woods very serious. The little rain that has fallen in the northwestern part of the state, Elliott said, has done little to relieve the condition. No rain has fallen in the southern and eastern parts of the state and some serious fires have occurred. The letter says that in the past the most serious fires have occurred after September 1.

ORDER BAN ON DOUBLE PARKING

New Traffic Ordinance Becomes Effective Saturday On Order of City Council—Police to Patrol Streets Against Practice—Unloading Zones to Be Respected.

This is the last day of double parking of any kind in the business section of Medford and the police tomorrow morning will begin the enforcing of this feature especially of the new city traffic ordinance, on orders from the city council.

This announcement, made by Chief of Police McCredie this noon, comes like a thunderbolt out of a clear sky to the automobile public of the city and valley, as no previous intimation had been given as to just when the new traffic ordinance, passed at the behest of the city planning commission last June and the enforcement of which had been hanging fire ever since, would be enforced.

Double parking has been permitted for a long time past, provided the car was left in the custody of someone in its seat while the owner or driver was inside of a place shopping.

No double parking of any kind, however, will be permitted after today.

The spaces designated as unloading zones for business establishments will also go into effect tomorrow, and will all the other features of the new traffic ordinance, which was published practically in full at the time of its passage and again some time thereafter.

Copies of this ordinance and all other information regarding it can be obtained at the police station, formerly the old depot of the Jacksonville-Medford railroad.

A motorcycle officer will be added to the local police force to aid in enforcing the new traffic rules.

PEACE FOR PALESTINE DIFFICULT

British Forces Engage Arabs at Many Points in Guerilla Warfare—Bedouins Reported in Forays—Moslems to Appeal to League of Nations for Investigation.

JERUSALEM, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Pacification of the Holy Land has become increasingly difficult for the small British expeditionary forces which have engaged in guerilla warfare with Arabs at widely separated Palestine points.

The latest disquieting development was reported today with incursion of Bedouins from the Sinai peninsula, who fought the British in the vicinity of Gaza, Southern Palestine, and at Beersheba, about 30 miles southeast of Gaza.

Both places were scenes of sanguinary battles in Lord Allenby's drive against the Turks during the world war. Reinforcements have been sent to the aid of the British at both points.

At the same time raiding Arabs skirmished with British troops in the vicinity of Mount Tabor, midway between the Sea of Galilee and the Syrian frontier, about 15 miles from each. In a skirmish at Et Mesh, southeast of Nazareth, Arab footers suffered 25 casualties and a Yorkshire detachment of the British troops one.

The Moslem leaders announced they had decided to appeal to the League of Nations and to the world powers, excepting those exercising mandates, to investigate their grievances against the Jews.

They claimed the British mandate administration had brought on the situation by granting Jewish immigration and Arab workers suffered 25 casualties and a Yorkshire detachment of the British troops one.

Young Quakers Hint Rebellion Against Elders

OSKALOOSA, Iowa, Sept. 6.—(AP)—A threatened rebellion of young Quakerism against the conservative methods of their elders loomed today following the pronouncement at yesterday's sessions of the All-American Friends' conference that the old Quaker practices were obsolete and inefficient.

Two young men from the Pacific coast, leaders in the annual meetings in their states, stood together in the assertion that "Young Friends" are clamoring for a change in methods. They were Frank W. Dell of Whittier, Cal., and Edward Mott of Oregon.
