September 17, 9:00 a. m.—15th annual session at Ontario; Call to order by president. Invocation. Address of welcome, E. C. Van-Patten; president's annual address; reports of standing committees; announcements and reports by secretary.

Address, "The Settlement Problem of the Vale and Owyhee Projects," H. A. Bashore, construction engineer, Vale project, U. S. reclamation bureau.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McCallen spent the week-end at Crescent City.

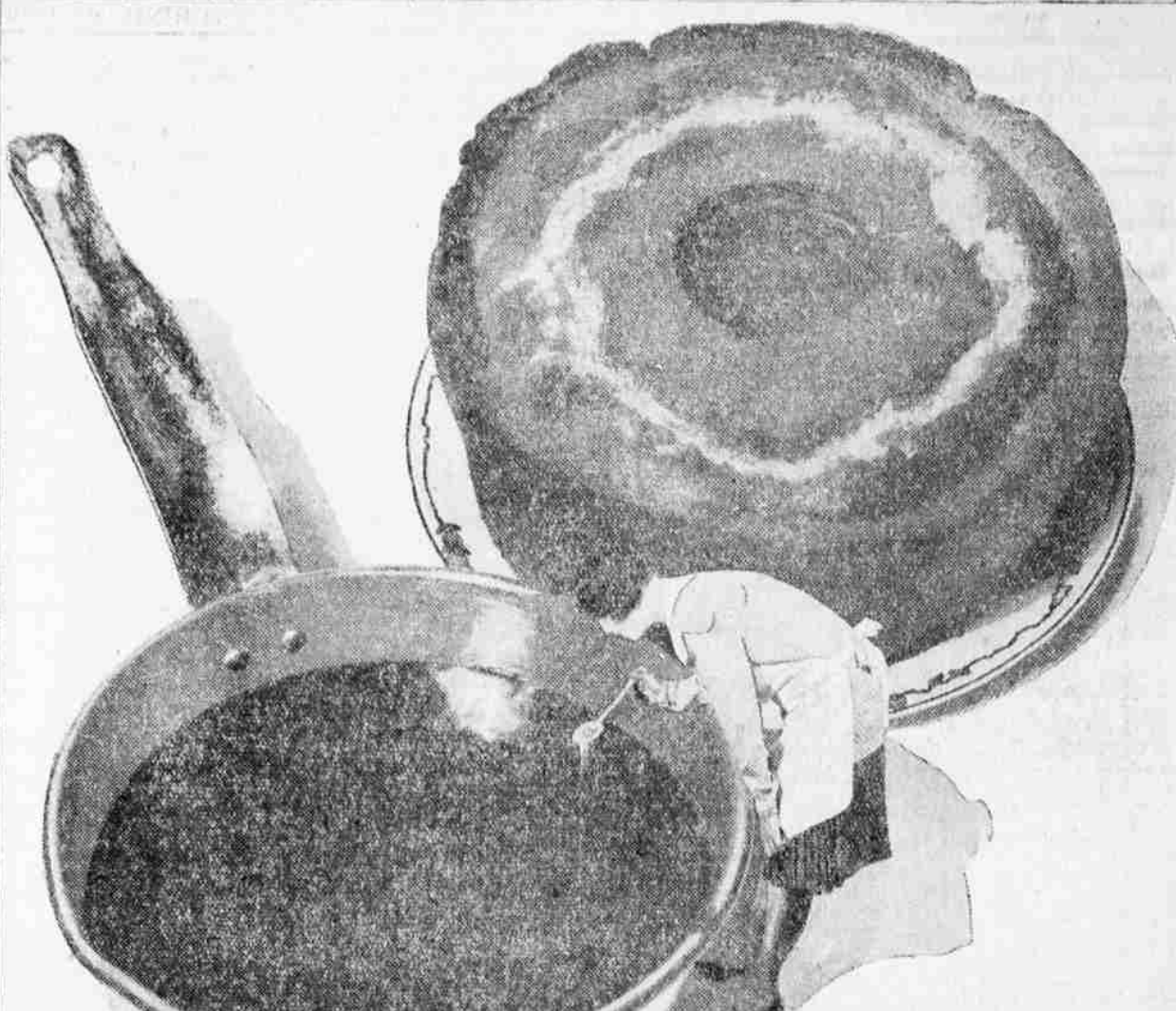
