

SIXTY-SEVEN CARS OF PEARS ROLLED ON NIGHT FREIGHT

Sixty-seven cars of pears were shipped from Medford last night bound for the markets of the east. This included the first D'Anjou shipment of the season which was made up of three cars of that variety.

Barbets shipped Thursday totaled 24 cars. Of this figure 26 were bound for canneries and 25 were packed for the markets of the east. Barbett shipments are expected to continue heavy for the next two weeks as many are now being taken from the pre-cooling plants and started on the way east.

In addition to the three cars of D'Anjou shipped there were ten cars of other late varieties in the lot. Seven of these were Bosc and three Howell.

Heavy shipments will continue throughout the week-end, fruit of fields say, as the packing houses are now working day and night on the last pickings of the Barbets.
