

LOWE RENEWS OREGON EXHIBIT IN SACRAMENTO

New Shipments Arriving Daily for Diamond Jubilee—Pears Give Way to Potatoes—16-Foot Corn Is Rogue Feature.

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 6.—(Special)—Oregon's exhibit at the Diamond Jubilee California State Fair and Western States exposition here is an ever-changing panorama of freshness.

Under the able direction of D. M. Lowe, veteran exhibitor, new shipments arrive on ice daily from Oregon and replace the fruits, vegetables and flowers wilted by the warm weather.

Where yesterday a wide expanse of pears glistened in the sun, today, for instance, are four different varieties of peaches, arranged in unobtrusively attractive designs, aided by the difference in colors.

One of the most spectacular features of the display is the 16-foot corn which arrived yesterday from the Rogue River valley. It towers above the booths in the Western States building and is the source of unending admiration.

Among the new shipments received are four varieties of bulk peas, three new kinds of winter beans, three new onion exhibits and fresh canned fruit in glass jars.

All of the products from Oregon are inspected at the state border by California quarantine officers. Lowe is insistent that this shall be done although fruit and vegetables for exhibition purposes usually are not put to as close scrutiny as those sent in for commercial uses.

Several attempts have been made by other western states to find a man taller than the 7 foot 8 inch tall, but telegrams have revealed that even the biggest in several inches short. A \$14 hat has been offered to the man who can top this shock.

Gladioli spikes from Oregon both ranches will be given fair visitors when the ordered shipment arrives, probably late today.

After the present agricultural showing has been on display for another day or two, fresh peaches will be the predominant note in the exhibit.

Attendance for the first four days at the exposition has exceeded 200,000 and directors predict a total of 500,000 before its close, Sept. 9.

COMMUNISTS ARE HELD BY CHINESE

MCKDEN, Manchuria, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Provincial officials reported today that 114 Russians, charged with communist activities, were being detained in an internment camp north of the Sungari river. Of the prisoners, 71 were women.

Each prisoner was said to receive two pounds of bread daily, together with vegetables, sugar and tea. A hospital is attached to the camp. Friends and relatives may bring clothes and food, but conversation and correspondence between them is forbidden.

Each prisoner, it was said, will be tried individually by a chief justice and eight judges, but it will be some time before all can be arraigned.

GRAPE INDUSTRY SEES HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The future of the California grape growing industry appeared brighter today in the light of advice from Washington, which told of approval by the federal farm relief board of a plan presented by Donald D. Conn, managing director of the California vineyardists' association, and the subsequent announcement of a program for slash reclamation of the 1929 California crop.

NEW ORLEANS STRIKE AGREEMENT REACHED

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Because an agreement has been reached between union and public service corporation officials, in New York the city returned to normalcy today after a two months' car strike.

Announcement of the agreement was reflected favorably by the city street cars which have operated on regular schedules with only a few minor interruptions since loaded.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Dispatches to El Universal from Torreón today said armed bandits yesterday attacked a payroll train of the Ferrocarril Minero company near Bermejillo and robbed it of \$5,000 pesos (about \$12,000). An airplane was sent to air troops in locating the bandits.

ROGUE POOLS ARE DRAGGED FOR LOST BOY

Search continued today for John Wright, missing since Tuesday afternoon, by residents of the Prospect district. One group, from an improvised raft, dragged Rogue river. Another band combed the heavy timber between Red Bluff and Prospect, on the theory that Wright, partially dazed, climbed from the river and bewildered and suffering from exposure is wandering through the woods.

A creel partially filled with fish was found on the bank of the river yesterday at a short distance from the spot where the fishing pole was found the day of his disappearance. Friends hold that Wright cast off the fishing creel as he pulled himself from the river and became lost while trying to make his way back to the rest of the fishing party.

The creel was too heavy to float, and was so strapped that it could not have come loose from Wright's body.

James L. Grievs of Prospect said over the telephone this afternoon that it was his belief that Wright was drowned. He said he was a "fairly good woodsman" and would have been able to make his way to safety ere this.

Grievs said the searching parties left this morning early and would not return until dark tonight, unless the body was found.

The search in the river is being made in the deep pools.

DRUG SMUGGLERS WILL FACE TRIAL

SHANGHAI, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Departed from the United States after the revelation of an opium smuggling plot of huge proportions, Yang Kao, former Chinese vice consul at San Francisco, and his young wife were taken into custody by Chinese authorities here today upon their arrival aboard the steamer Shinyo Maru. They face trial by the government in connection with the plot. Instead of being jailed at Shanghai as was expected, they would be taken to Nanking, where they were booked for trial in the Nanking courts, although the date of their trial was not officially made known.

EXPECT ARREST BANK SWINDLER

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The Burns detective agency today announced that they expected to arrest before night Charles DeLoe Waggoner, bank president of Telluride, Colorado, in whose name \$200,000 was obtained in certified checks under questionable circumstances from six big New York banks.

C. H. Hottendorf, assistant manager of the protective department of the American Bankers' association, said Waggoner, or a man representing himself as Waggoner, had been reported in a city west of the Mississippi today and that he would be arrested on his arrival in another western city, to which he was traveling.

HELEN WILLS SUFFERS ATTACK OF TONSILITIS

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Suffering from acute tonsillitis, Miss Helen Wills, international tennis star, prepared today to undergo a minor operation at a hospital here. Announcement of the famous tennis player's illness was made last night by Dr. C. A. Wills, her father, who disclosed that his daughter had been forced to cancel her scheduled match with Miss Betty Nuthall, English tennis star, in Berkeley September 12.
