

JACKSON COUNTY 4-H CLUB BOOTH FOR STATE FAIR

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 7. (Special)—Enthusiasm and interest in 4-H club work all over the state point to the biggest exhibition at the Oregon State Fair, Sept. 23 to 27, this year than ever before, according to H. C. Seymour, state club leader.

The delegation from Jackson county, with its numerous clubs, is expected to furnish an unusually fine exhibit, under the supervision of Mrs. Mable Mack, Medford, Home Demonstration Agent.

The 4-H booths will be housed this year in a completely renovated portion of the old agricultural pavilion, the rest of which has been torn down to be replaced by the new exhibit building and grandstand, put up at a cost of \$150,000. The club exhibition will have plenty of space in its redecorated building, which has been moved to a position near the new agricultural pavilion, one of the most frequented spots on the grounds.

Two 4-H club children from every county, outstanding in the work, will come to the fair as guests of the state fair board for the entire week. They will live in the spacious dormitory under the supervision of responsible chaperones and they will have not only the opportunity of seeing the whole fair, but will learn to know each other and find out what boys and girls in other districts are doing. Everything will be furnished them except bedding, which each must provide for himself.

Besides the numerous premiums and scholarships to the annual summer school at the Oregon Agricultural college, amounting to almost \$5,000, there will be many special prizes, including a pure-bred Oxford lamb, a Jersey calf, a Holstein calf, a Guernsey calf, and a combination sander and wheel hoe.
