

BLUE LEDGE TO INSTALL HYDRO POWER PLANT

After several months of preliminary negotiations, plans for the operation of the Blue Ledge dam, by the recently organized Consolidated Copper Company are getting under way.

A bond issue for the construction of power plant at Seattle has been placed on the market. The operation of the dam, a concentrating mill and an aerial tramway, has been planned, and work on the construction of the power plant will start in an early date.

Thomas A. Sawyer, of Portland, a hydraulic engineer, with W. S. Turner and Co., as consulting engineers, has been awarded the contract for the installation of the power plant. It will be of the low head type, cost about \$1,000,000 and will use the waters of Klallam and Caribby creeks and the big Agulaga. Until the power plant is in operation, the mine cannot operate full time.

According to Dr. J. F. Roddy, the present plan is to install a "sluiceway" for concentrating, with installations are completed for the installation of a 2,000-horsepower concentrating mill, using the sluiceway system. Plants of this type are operated on a regular basis.

With funds provided by the federal government and the state, the road to the Blue Ledge camp has been made possible.

A force of 12 men are now employed, working on the dump at the mine. No large force of men will be employed until the mine is in full operation.

It is expected to carry on construction work until heavy winter weather comes.

Several state traffic law violation cases were up in Judge Tuck's court today. Chester Carter, driver for a Pickwick station was fined \$10 and costs on a reckless driving charge. It being charged that he was driving his place on the Pacific highway at 45 miles an hour when trained by State Traffic Officer H. N. Phillips just before his arrest. Mr. Carter claimed that his speedometer was faulty.

A J. Laport, a logging truck driver who lives near Rock in the Applegate section was fined \$5 for speeding his car on South River side avenue late last Saturday night. Officer Phillips also made this arrest.

Because of his failure to appear in justice court this forenoon on a complaint preferred by State Traffic Officer Phillips, a warrant has been issued for the arrest of Sam Metz, who is accused of driving with no lights at an illegal rate of speed on Riverside avenue Saturday night. He is also accused by Officer Phillips of driving without an operator's license, having blood lenses in the headlights and having defective lighting apparatus. Rockhouse is charged in the accusation that Metz was driving with a car door open with a passenger. Odele Rock, living in an adjacent intoxicated condition on the floor of the car with his feet hanging outside. Rock was arrested for intoxication and was scheduled to appear in court today also.

FOOTBALL STARS RETURN TO HELP LOCAL PROSPECT

With the return to school today of Orbin Cooke and A. Putter, the prospects at the high school looked up considerably. Cooke was full back of last year's state champions and Putter was the awkward yard gaining fullback of the second string.

Coch Hagan was also cheered by the discovery that a young man by the name of Stone, who moved here with his folks from California last spring, is a backfield man of experience. Stone is taller than Cooke, and a second string fullback, and Applegate, the fullback, is plenty fast.

The football squad held a two-hour practice Saturday morning and has started signal practice and the perfecting of team play.

From the present outlook Coach Hagan will have plenty of backfield material, but is shy a center and a quarterback. The center prospects are small and lack belt. Joe Caven, Jr., is the leading candidate.

Charles Clay and Charles Thomas are the two prospects for quarter back. Thomas is also an end prospect. Clay has a good football heart but lacks the range ruggedness of Thomas.

Bill Cunningham, a husky from the junior high, is trying out for the line. He has the size but so far has been handicapped by slowness in the fundamentals of football. Cunningham, another junior high star, is a halfback candidate. He is a cousin of the Hughes brothers and, like them, is silent as the principal forest.

The football team will make its first public appearance of the season Saturday, September 28, in the annual game with the alumni.

Scott declared he was blinded by the lights of an approaching car.

The place will be closed until the last of April or the first of May, 1930.

This summer has been one of the most successful seasons since the natatorium was opened under the management of the Merricks in 1916. Much of the success of this is due to Mr. and Mrs. P. A. McDonald, athletic instructor, formerly of Honolulu, who turned out more than 150 satisfactory swimmers during their stay here. They have been secured to return for next season, Mr. Merrick said today.

Mrs. McDonald is teaching school at Crescent, Ore., near Klamath Falls, and Mr. McDonald expects to leave for Honolulu after several weeks to complete a contract as instructor with the Outrigger Canoe club.

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BOYS JAILED FOR ENTERING HOUSE

Accused of burglary in breaking into a ranch house in the Medford area, three boys, Nelson Cannon, 16, William Cook and John Davis, 15, of the Heidebrecht area are in the county jail, following their arrest in Medford yesterday by policeman William Peck. The boys are said to have confessed to the theft of a gun and ammunition and to have sold the gun in Medford for eight dollars.

When questioned this forenoon, Cannon could not tell into whose home he had broken outside of the fact that "it was up Anderson creek," and officers so far have been unable to learn the identity of the owner of the gun.

AIRPORT DEDICATION STAMP IS RECEIVED

The official stamp to be used on the first air mail letters to be sent from Medford's new municipal airport October 2 was received by Secretary Ted Baker of the chamber of commerce today. A winged circle is a feature of the stamp, on which are the words, "First Flight, October 2, 1929, Medford, Oregon. Municipal Dedication July 8, 4, 5, 1929."

The stamp is attractive and will be placed on each air mail envelope with a suitable color of ink.

So far over 2000 letters have been received at the chamber of commerce for the first flight and local and southern Oregon residents, wishing to send letters, are urged to leave them as early as possible at the chamber. Several eastern stamp collectors have already ordered a large number of letters to be sent.

HELEN NORRIS ENJOYED CRATER LAKE AIR TRIP

"You've never seen Crater Lake until you've seen it from the air," said Helen Norris, local playwright and author of the airport dedication program, who rode in the Ford 12 passenger plane, the West Wind, to the scenic wonder Saturday evening. Helen has taken the trip several times before and has ridden around the rim in an automobile, but this was her first trip by air as well as her very first airplane ride.

That one gets an entirely different conception of the wonders of Crater Lake when viewing it from above, was another statement made by Miss Norris, who was especially impressed with the fantastic effect of Wizard Island, the beauty of which is enhanced, she says, from the aerial viewpoint.

They will attend the first day of the fair on Wednesday forenoon and then depart for Crater Lake, where after looking over the park they will continue on their auto tour via eastern Oregon to Yellowstone National park. They will not come back this way on the return trip to Yosemite as on leaving Yellowstone park they will depart for visits at Zion National park in Utah and the Grand Canyon National park in Arizona before returning home.

In a short telephone interview this noon Colonel Thomson expressed himself as delighted with the remodeling of the Crater National park and that his successor there in the superintendency, E. C. Solinsky, is making so good.

"Solinsky is certainly ringing the bell, according to all reports reaching me," said Colonel Thomson.

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MANY ADDITIONAL COLLEGE COURSES FOR STATE TERM

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 7.—(Special)—With the inauguration of a new post degree granting school of health and physical education and the completion of plans for a number of new courses in addition to the regular curriculum, everything is in readiness at the college for the resumption of the upcoming freshman class September 23.

All campus work in student health, physical education for both men and women, hygiene and industrial sports will be combined in the school of health and physical education with Dr. Clair A. Langston as dean. The health service quarters have been remodeled and Dr. D. C. Reynolds appointed as new director. The staff this year, for the first time, will also include a woman doctor, Miss Edith Edgington, for the co-eds.

Two-year curricula in both agriculture and home economics will be inaugurated this year for the benefit of students wishing to obtain practical training in these subjects without spending the four-year course. If the student later decides to work for a degree, a certificate is awarded upon the satisfactory completion of the two-year course.

Another addition this year is a privately supported, non-sectarian chair of religion, with Dr. E. W. Warrington as head, through which any student may obtain courses of religious grade for which full credit toward graduation will be given. Courses will be offered in such subjects as orientation of religious leadership, character education and the historical background of the Bible.
