

COAST LEADERS HOLD HOT PACE BY DOUBLE WINS

Stars and Reds Clean Up Admission Day Games—
Senators Suffer 19 to 4 Defeat—11 Runs Scored in Seventh Frame.

Double victories by the first place Hollywood Stars and the second place San Francisco Mission Reds had served today to quicken the pace in the Pacific Coast league pennant race. The Stars have been in first place the greater part of the last 10 days, and the Mission Reds have been hot on their heels.

The Stars cleaned up in their two games against the Oakland Oaks at Emeryville ball park, winning in the morning, 4 to 2, and in the evening, 6 to 5. Roy Carls and Johnny Verges dropped a couple over the fence in the morning affair to gain the two runs for the Stars. Buzz Arlett and Ernie Lombardi, also of the Oaks, hit for the circuit in the afternoon. Joe Marty, pitching for the Stars, won a mound duel from Pet Daglia in the closer.

Red Killefer's Missions trampled over the Sacramento Senators first at Stockton, 6 to 4, and later at Sacramento, 19 to 4, this making up for the double defeat of the Mission Reds the day before. The matinee debacle was one of the most crushing disasters hung on the Senators in several seasons. The grand climax came in the seventh frame when the Missions scored 11 runs on as many hits at the expense of Gould, Flynn and Cano. The Reds had already scored eight runs off Lefty Vinil and Gould.

The Seals beat Portland twice and took the nine-game series with six wins and three defeats. The Seals won the morning game, 7 to 2, and repeated the process in the afternoon by the same score.

Seattle and Los Angeles split the Admission day honors at Los Angeles. The Indians took the opener, 8 to 6, and the Angels nailed the nightcap, 5 to 3. The second game was called at the end of four innings to allow Seattle to catch a train. The first game was a home run duel, Steinbeck and Falk driving in five of their runs by the same method.

MCCARTHY'S CUBS AFTER 8 GAMES TO CLINCH FLAG

Joe McCarthy's Chicago Cubs set forth today in quest of eight more victories, all they need to clinch the 1929 National league pennant.

As the situation stood today the Cubs by winning eight of their remaining games would wind up with a record of 55 victories and 54 defeats. Pittsburgh, by winning all of its 21 remaining games would finish with 58 victories and 55 defeats, the difference being that two Chicago games with St. Louis have been washed permanently off the schedule. Every Pittsburgh defeat from now on, of course, will make the Cubs' already easy task that much easier.

The two leaders each chalked up victories yesterday, the Cubs knocking out Boston, 4 to 3, and Pittsburgh outslugging Brooklyn, 9 to 7.

A four run rally in the seventh gave the Pirates their hard fought triumph over Brooklyn. Soule, a recruit from Wichita, drove in the tying run in the seventh and later scored a run that added to the Pirates' advantage. Ernie Hansen went the route for Pittsburgh, although he was reached for 14 hits.

The New York Giants took two from Cincinnati, 6 to 4 and 10 to 4, in five innings. The Giants concentrated their attack on Adolph Lueke in the second inning of the first game for four runs and then added two more off Ken Ash in the ninth.

The Phils bunched hits to down St. Louis, 9 to 3. Sweetland had only one hit in the second, when the Cards scored all their runs.

Danny MacPeyden outpitched Jack Ogden and the Boston Red Sox beat the St. Louis Browns, 6 to 2. The game was scheduled as the first part of a double header but rain forced postponement of the second game.

In the only other American league game of the day, young Ed Walsh gave Washington only six hits and Chicago beat the Senators 4 to 1. A three run White Sox rally in the seventh sent Ed Bam Jones to the showers.

Value of Poultry to Rogue Valley Not Thoroughly Understood, Avers Westerfield, Who Quotes Statistics

To the close observer the importance of the poultry industry to this valley is not understood, however there is always a cause behind every ill and this lack of understanding is prompted by the experiences of the past. Looking at the matter from this angle we soon discover the cause.

The writer has been fairly well acquainted with the poultry situation throughout this valley for about twenty years and during that time many things have happened, some of which have resulted disastrously to those engaged in the business, as well as to the valley.

Men, feeling themselves capable of becoming breeders have engaged in the business and built up a very profitable business on breeding stock purchased from some reliable master breeder and for a time things looked very promising, but as the business expanded and it became necessary to increase the flock to supply the demand, it also became necessary for these breeders to use their own judgment in selecting breeders and mating the flocks for the next year. The influence of the master breeder was of course eliminated, because of the use of their own judgment, but such selections and matings made with limited experience resulted in lowering the quality of the stock produced, both in production and longevity, which of course resulted in disappointment and failure and such undertaking went up in smoke.

Anyone can hatch a chicken, but few can qualify as capable breeders so many of the chicks sold to poultrymen of this valley this season have proven to be far below the average in livability, no matter

whose feed they were fed. This condition is largely chargeable to the breeder, so unless the poultryman of this valley comes together and organizes themselves into a Poultry Breeders association for the express purpose of breeding better and more profitable poultry and agree to follow up to date poultry practices, looking to the higher hatchability of eggs and the higher livability of chicks, just so long will the business men of the valley look upon the industry as doubtful and of little consequence.

Looking at the poultry industry nationally, we find it is one of the most promising lines of agriculture.

Its value to the nation is one and a half billion dollars annually. Its value is equal to 80 per cent of the capital of all national banks. It is 22½% of all the money in circulation in the United States. It is 82 per cent of the value of all swine.

It is nearly double the value of all the fruit and fruit products. Its development is the greatest need in any locality and especially in the Rogue River valley. And why?

Because the eggs produced in the Pacific northwest, which of course includes this valley, sell at a premium over all other eggs, no matter where produced.

Again, the poultrymen of this valley enjoy a rate on eggs to the same markets equal to the rates from Portland and other Pacific coast points.

With a determined effort to produce the best producing poultry in the northwest right here in this valley, there is a bright future for every breeder and every hatchery in this valley.

Famine Area in China Increases As Crop Failures Are Continued; Farmers Have No Reserve Seeds

CANTON, China (AP)—There will be little relief for China's starving millions this fall if the crop statistics are correct in their calculations.

This will be especially true in the South China provinces of Kwangsi and Kwangtung, where the principal crop, rice, is below normal. There are 49,000,000 people in the provinces and the normal rice crop is about 4,000,000 short tons.

Spring rainfall this year was 25 per cent less than the average in Kwangsi and Kwangtung, so the farmers have passed through one of the most serious droughts in 50 years. Large provincial cities depending on rain for their water supplies have faced serious shortages of the precious liquid and even the British colony of Hong-

long endured a two months' dry spell that drained every reservoir. Thousands went thirsty and water was shipped in from Shanghai and Manila by chartered steamer.

Lack in the interior conditions were worse. And now the Chinese farmer is wondering where his winter provisions are coming from. To satisfy the city consumer, merchants throughout South China contracted for September deliveries of rice from Singapore, Siam and Indo-China. It was also anticipated that there will be a substantial increase in American wheat flour imports, although money switches in luxury and foreign made goods will be less than last year.

Estimates of the first rice crop place the yield at between 20 and 40 per cent of normal. Coupled with the fact that there was a 70 per cent reduction in the yield of the second rice crop last fall, due

also to drought, the shortage this year will have serious consequences. Rice farmers near rivers and canals resorted to irrigation and in their fields the crop is practically assured. Such fields, however, are few and far between and the crop they produce will be small compared with the amount needed. The most lamentable fact about the situation is that the farmer will need two or three years to recover, counting that 1928 and 1929 are good years. The majority are too poor to carry reserve seed and they farm year after year, trusting to luck that they will produce enough grain to furnish food for the winter, need for the next planting and, if extremely lucky, a surplus for sale.

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
