Also it is believed that it will lower the price of such commodi-ties as gasoline, distillate and oil, a large amount of which is used by the farmers, as these can then be shipped direct from a nearby coast harbor by truck and so dispense with the long railroad haul.

Should this road go through, the wholesale and retail public market, which the Pomona grange of Jack-son county is endeavoring, will be assured a successful wholesale trade and so the growing of garden truck will receive a great stimulus in this district.

John Anderson gave an interest-ing and instructive talk on the status of the finances of the Farm-ers Cooperative exchange, which is brought as the grange market-ing organization.

As this organization becomes better finan-cially, the overhead expense will be reduced and a greater profit as-sured.

The master announced that the first and second degrees will be conferred at the next regular meet-ing, held on Tuesday, September 17, at 8:30 p. m., by the Junior de-gree team, and so all waiting to take these degrees are requested to be present at this meeting.

The lecture hour program con-sisted of playing games, which was a change from the regular program and created considerable merriment.

The lecturer announced that the Lake Creek grange would put on the lecture program at our next regular meeting, this program to be in charge of Miss Beth Farlow, lecturer of the Lake Creek grange.

SERIAL ON PROPHET SHOCKS YOUNG TURKS

CONSTANTINOPLE (AP)—A Stamboul newspaper "Iktidam," owned by a group of Turkish de-pu-ties, is publishing a serial life of the Prophet Mohammed in which, probably for the first time in the history of Turkish publications, he is referred to not with the tradi-tional title of respect "hazretleri" ("honored"), but simply as "that man."

In one chapter, for instance, he is "that man who, after having been faithful to one wife for forty years, found at the age of sixty, the need of taking unto himself three wives more."

Shocked comments are rife not only among the old-timers but also among young Turks, bred under the new regime, who say that while they do not care to partake in the old Moslem ritual and do not, for the most part, even attend mosque services, nevertheless they do still cleave to Mohammed as their prophet and as their ethical ideal. They declare that any utterance against him "squares the circle" of this being the Turkish expression to describe unpleasant sensation.

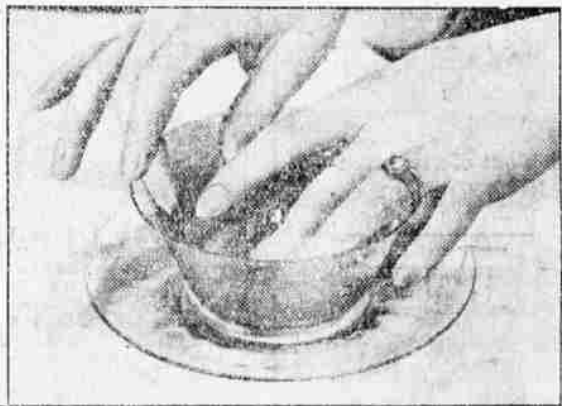

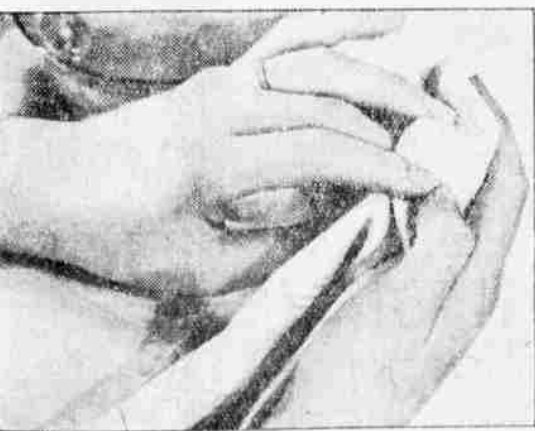
