SEEK 100 MEN TO BATTLE BLAZE IN UMPQUA FORESTS

Up to early this afternoon no new fires on state or forest land had been reported at the headquarters office here of the Crater National forest, and all the recent fires in the forest or on state land were either out, or under control and being patrolled.

However, the adjoining national forests are not facing so well, especially the Umpqua national forest district, where several bad fires on state land are raging on a six mile front and not enough fire fighters can be obtained to combat them.

Hence this morning Dwight Phillips, district fire warden of Jackson county, received a phone message from the district fire warden's office at Roseburg urgently requesting that 100 fire fighters from Medford and vicinity be found, if possible, and sent to Roseburg to work on these fires with the local force.

Mr. Phillips started out at once in endeavor to locate that number of fire fighters, with what result is not known as efforts to locate him this forenoon and early this afternoon were unsuccessful.
