

MISSION REDS DUST STARS IN LEAD POSITION

Barrage of Homers Laid
Down By San Francisco
Brings in Ten Counters—
Ducks Succumb to Oak-
land Twirling.

The San Francisco Mission Reds today were back at the top of the Pacific Coast league pack after many weeks of strenuous effort to regain their lost prestige.

The Reds displaced the Hollywood Stars in the first position yesterday by defeating the southern team at Los Angeles 13 to 7. Seven homers were batted out, three by Buzz Huff and the others by Ike Brown, Jack Sherlock and Gordon Slade for the Missions, and Mickey Heath for Hollywood. The Missions' great clutch accounted for ten of the scores off Buzz Weizel and Hank Hulvey. Sensational fielding by Sherlock, Finn and Boone saved the Hollywood runs and brought an easy victory.

Sacramento found little trouble disposing of the Seattle Indians in their first series game of the week at the capital city. The score was 7 to 4. Lemansky was hit freely and so was Ed Bryan, but the Reds made their singles count. Five hits in the fifth and sixth innings were used for markers.

A 7 to 4 victory for the San Francisco Stars climaxed their clash with the Los Angeles Angels at Recreation park. Roberts starting on the mound for Los Angeles, was driven from the box in the fourth inning with a foul rally that eventually netted six runs. Walter Malle pitched steady ball for the winners and was given great support.

Howard Craghead, burly right hander, pitched Oakland to a 2 to 1 triumph over Portland. Until the ninth when they made their two tallies on three hits, the Ducks were able to nick for a single safety only. The Oaks reached Chesterfield for their three counts in the second frame.

As the Cubs marked time through an open date in the schedule yesterday, the Athletics rushed several series nearer a pennant already theirs to all intents and purposes. The National league's abbreviated program was featured by the game at Forbes field. Watson Clark and Jess Petty engaged in a keen pitching duel for seven rounds only to permit the contest to go completely on the home playing in the last two innings. The Pirates pulled out the decision by 7 to 4 when Paul Wagner drove in two runs with a triple in the ninth.

The Reds defeated the Giants by 7 to 5 at Cincinnati. The Reds had an open date.

RIALTO TALKIE EQUIPMENT OF LATEST DESIGN

With equipment equally as good as that used in the large show houses throughout the country, the Rialto will make its bow to the Medford and southern Oregon movie public as a theatre presenting talking motion pictures exclusively. Following careful preparation, the doors will open tomorrow afternoon for matinee performances, presenting the four Marx brothers in "Cocanuts," which played to capacity houses at Hunt's Criterion last week.

The production made such a decided hit that it is by popular demand that the picture will be shown at the Rialto. Hundreds were turned away last week and to accommodate all who have not seen this side-splitting comedy, it will play at the Rialto tomorrow, Friday and Saturday. It will be followed by another extraordinary talkie, Ken Maynard in "The Wagon Master," opening on Sunday. This picture is said by metropolitan critics to rival, and in some cases do, "In Old Arizona," about which movie fans still talk, although the picture was shown here months ago. The production is staged entirely outdoors.

Latest Equipment

The equipment installed in the Rialto is the latest procurable and has the advantage of the many improvements made on talking equipment during the past 18 months. The theatre is equipped for both vitaphone and movietone productions, and silent pictures, with the possible exception of certain news reels, will no longer be shown there.

However, Sterling Rothermel, who has delighted Rialto audiences for some time past, will be retained for a time, assuring good pipe organ music as well as the latest talking movies, short and long subjects.

A recent sound test revealed the theatre to have the best acoustics obtainable, and it is the belief of S. G. Mendonhall, manager of the Rialto, that no other theatre in the state, and possibly on the coast, can equal the Rialto for sound effects. Due to the smaller space, the talking equipment, he explained, does not have to be operated with loud tones, in some cases distorting the speech and music.

The equipment of the Rialto is identical with the same as that used in Grauman's Chinese theatre in Hollywood, New Fox in San Francisco, Portland theatre, Fox Broadway in Portland, Fifth Avenue in Seattle, in addition to many others throughout the country.

JEWS FEAR FOOD SUPPLY POISONED BY ARAB ENEMIES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Scattered reports of a minor character were reported today from Palestine. Muslim Arabs and Jews generally, however, settled to their old routine of life adjoining one another.

Jewish housewives found themselves hard put to get food after spreading of stories that Arab fruit dealers had poisoned goods sold to Jews. A Jewish boycott on Arab products also complicated the food problem and the leading Jewish hotel in Jerusalem was able to serve only rice at one meal.

In Jerusalem a parade by British soldiers wearing steel helmets and carrying fixed bayonets late Monday was accepted as an attempt to alter any panic. Jews of the old city having become nervous when large numbers of Moslems began to leave their homes.

TEACHERS IN LONDON APPROVE FAIRY TALES

LONDON.—(AP)—A normal childhood, with a belief in fairies and a knowledge of nursery rhymes, was urged upon teachers by speakers before the English-American education conference in London.

Representatives of school and nursery organizations in both countries attended the conference, which was designed to stimulate common understanding between British and American educators. "The very greatest mistake the teacher can make," said Dr. P. H. Haldy, divisional inspector of the London county council, "is to treat the child as an adult. He must be allowed to live his own life."

Of course the child must be allowed to grow up. He must pass naturally from the Tommy Tucket and Little Jack Horner nursery rhymes to more mature reading.

Miss E. Mae Raymond, instructor at the Teachers' college of Columbia university, emphasized the need of educating adults to the needs of childhood.
