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EXCELLENT EXHIBIT OF LIVESTOCK

Fair Barns Crowded By Aristocrats of Livestock. Poultry and Rabbit Kingdoms—Many Valley Farms Display Stock—Club Entries Add to the Feathered Exhibit.

Better than expectations, exhibits in the livestock, poultry and rabbit divisions of the Jackson County Fair, which opened today near Medford, included the largest variety in years and were crowding their various departments, especially entries by boys' county clubs. Where last year there was ample room in the livestock division, many entries could not be accepted because of insufficient space.

Among the many interesting things visitors saw in this division today was a 400-pound sow, entered by the Union Brothers of Central Point. So large is this animal that it is scarcely able to waddle about. In addition to the sow, they have five pens of purebred hogs on exhibit.

William J. Warner and son and S. H. Young are showing a sow with a litter of 11 pigs, raised on the Warner ranch near Phoenix. One of the largest exhibitors in the hog division is the Klingler Hog farm of Ashland with nine pens of a variety of breeds. The Klingler farm is one of the largest of its kind in southern Oregon. W. Thomas of Murphy has four pens on exhibit. Leonard Freeman of Central Point, three pens, and four pens are being shown by club boys. A number of Chester White hogs are also being shown by Edgar Grimes of Harrisburg. Latorop Brothers of Central Point have six pens and S. Smith of Central Point has one. In addition to these, a number of late entries were also expected.

Heavyweight Bull
Said to be one of the largest Holstein bulls on the Pacific coast, a bull weighing 2800 pounds, is exhibited by Edgar Grimes, who brought 24 head of cattle, mostly Holstein, and 47 head of sheep to the fair. However, a portion of the stock was entered by club boys of Linn county, including John Grimes, Leo Ellis, R. Grimes, Paul Quimby and Ben Christensen. They are members of a club headed by Edgar Grimes.

S. H. Young and W. J. Warner and son have a string of 14 good appearing Jersey cows on show, and nearly take up one side of the barn. A number of Lakeland Ayrshire are exhibited from Grants Pass and the usual exhibition of good looking stock from the Mount Crest ranch near Hill, Calif., is also being shown.

Kirkland Exhibits
A string of milking Shorthorns, entered by the Kirkland Farm near Central Point, attracted special attention from the many visitors and is one of the three herds in Jackson county. The Kirkland Farm is also showing two large black Percheron horses and four saddle horses. Ben Hur, Beau Geste, Ramona and Bob. The "Standardbred" saddle horse of Wes Lawton of Medford is also being shown.

Included among the exhibitors of dairy and beef cows are Newberry and Son of Talent, Ernest Callahan, Charley Brothers of Lake Creek, J. McCracken of Ashland and others whose names were not available this morning.

Sheep Division
In the sheep division the Oxford, Shropshire, Cotswold, Romney breeds seem to be the most popular. In addition to the 47 head of sheep entered by the Linn county club boys, there are numerous Jackson county club entries. The Mount Crest ranch has four pens of Shropshires, Don Runyard of Gold Hill has one pen of Shropshires, Fred Lofland of Central Point has a pen of Romneys, J. A. Schade, Jr., of Central Point has five pens of Shropshires. A number of late entries were also expected.

Poultry Exhibit
As the result of long preparation by A. H. Willett of the Villa Rosa ranch near Medford, the poultry exhibit is one of the best seen in southern Oregon for quantity and quality, and includes exhibits from several large producers, including the Villa Rosa ranch with Austral-Orp and other poultry; C. A. Patton of Ashland, Haverd Hocks, and the White Wing Poultry Farm of Talent. There are also entries of exhibitors with smaller entries, including a large variety of chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese. Club work is also an important feature of this division, which was to be judged today by C. K. Reeser, secretary of Portland, a nationally known poultry expert.

Rabbit Exhibit
Last year was the first time a rabbit exhibit was shown at a Jackson county fair, and was a creditable display, but the exhibit of this year, under the charge of H. H. Lowe, outshines last year's success, especially in quality. Over 400 rabbits are on exhibit, with exhibitors including Portland, exhibiting Churchills, King Mountain, Blue company of Gold Hill, Silver Tips and Birkley C. S. Harts of Talent, Blue Berrys, W. J. Lawson of Maple Park Drive, New Zealand Whites and Chinchillas, C. C. Atkinson of Medford, American Whites, J. V. Harvey of Klamath Falls, Hanks, Sun Gold Rab-

bits of Talent, Flemish and New Zealand. In addition to these larger exhibits, there are over a score of entrants, some of whom have only one or two rabbits on show. One of the features of the exhibit is a Flemish doe, weighing 16 pounds, declared to be nearly a record weight for such rabbits in southern Oregon. This division was also scheduled to be judged today.

BEAUTIFUL CLOCK TO BE INSTALLED IN CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE, Ore., Sept. 11.—(Special.) A beautiful new clock has arrived to be hung in the archway between the lobby and the office of the lodge. The large, impressive looking instrument is set in a large cut of a cedar log about a foot in thickness with a diameter of three feet.

STATE DRY OPERATIVES BUSY DURING AUGUST

SCHOLARS ENROLL FOR STUDY UNDER FLAPPER TEACHER

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 11.—(AP.) Miss Mildred Doyle, 22, and pretty, who is accused by parents of her pupils of being a product of "a young, reckless, thoughtless, doubtful care, thinking of everything but the serious side of life," performed her duties as principal of the county high school near here without show of concern today while awaiting a hearing of the charges before the Knox county board of education.

The accusations, filed by several members of her school's Parent-Teachers' association, were answered by Miss Doyle by a statement in which she declared the mention of the flapper age "was a general indictment of the younger generation." She said the charges were vague and asked that they be dismissed. The Knox county board of education meets tomorrow.

Miss Doyle reported a record number of students have enrolled in her school since the allegations were made.

BLINDING STORM POSSIBLE CAUSE AIRPLANE CRASH

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 11.—(AP.) Officials of the Trans-Continental Air Transport said in a report last night that they were unable to give an irrefutable cause of the crash of the air liner, "City of San Francisco," with the loss of eight lives, but expressed the opinion that Pilot Stowe crashed into the side of Mount Taylor, N. M., at full speed and under full control. The report added that he might have been blinded momentarily by a severe storm.

The company's report of the accident was based largely on the report of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, chairman of the technical committee, who went to the scene of the disaster, and on the telegraphic report of Paul Collins, general superintendent of the line, who directed the search and visit of the wreck.

QUIZ GOVERNOR IN TEXTBOOK SCANDAL

FRANKFORT, Ky., Sept. 11.—(AP.) Governor Flem D. Sampson was scheduled to appear this morning before the Franklin county grand jury, to be questioned, it is understood, in connection with the investigation of the affairs of the state textbook commission, of which he is chairman. He was served with a summons yesterday.

Thirteen witnesses, consisting of five members of the commission and eight representatives of publishing firms which submitted bids on books to be adopted for use in Kentucky public schools, have been questioned for a total of more than 10 hours by the jury.

PORT ORCHARD MOTHER AND BABY SUCCUMB

BREMERTON, Wash., Sept. 11.—(AP.) Jeff Little of Port Orchard, who gave birth to a seven-pound daughter when she was run over Saturday by an automobile she was cranking while it was in gear, died in a hospital here. The infant died a few hours later. Two small children and the widower survive.
