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FIRST BOSCS FOR DETROIT SHIPPED TO LURE BUYERS

The first carload of Bosc pears for the Detroit market left yesterday morning. The Bosc are the cream of the Rogue River valley crop and were picked, packed and prepared under the direction of Prof. Henry Hartmann, Oregon State college horticultural expert, and Prof. F. C. Reimer of the Southern Oregon experimental station.

The two cars are the first of 20 to be sent to Detroit, in the winter pear committee's campaign for the development of the Bosc pear market in Detroit.

The Bosc will be placed on the Detroit market September 30, accompanied by radio and press announcements.

Professor Hartmann will leave for Detroit next week and will be in that city at the opening of the Bosc sales. They will not be placed on the market until he gives approval of their condition.

Some of the Bosc cars will be sent pre-cooled, some under plain storage, and Professor Hartmann will collect his first data therefrom in his intensive marketing and storage condition investigations.

Superintendent C. C. Solinsky of Crater Lake National park, and Superintendent C. G. Thompson of Yosemite National park left today for Yellowstone park to attend the conference of all park heads which convenes there next week. Mrs. Solinsky and Mrs. Thompson are making the trip also.

The conference, called the Buffalo Stampede, will be attended by government officials as well as the superintendents of all national parks. Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the Interior, Horace Albright, superintendent of the national park system, and others will take an active part in the sessions. Dr. Wilbur, Mr. Albright, and Professor Ansel F. Hall, chief naturalist of the national parks, passed through Oregon last week en route to the Yellowstone meeting.

Superintendent Thompson spent yesterday at Crater Lake visiting with friends and inspecting improvements carried on there this season.
