

GRANGE AID REFLECTED IN EXHIBITS

Horticultural Building Proving Big Attraction—Hittie Ranch Relics Are Shown—Commercial Fruit Display—Eden Valley and Villa Nurseries Maintain Booths

The importance of the grange movement to Jackson county is reflected in the creditable exhibits of the several granges represented in the Horticultural building and taking part in the annual Jackson county fair, which opened yesterday for four days. So complete are the exhibits in this building that visitors are led to believe no county product of any kind has been omitted.

There is no competition among the different booths, a cash being awarded to each. In addition to the grange booths, the building contains a creditable display of fruit, featuring pears and peaches, the greater portion of the former being shown in commercial lots. There are numerous individual vegetable and fruit exhibits and one or two of special interest.

Careful Preparation
The grange exhibits entered by Sams Valley, Talent, Lake Oak, Eagle Point, Lake Creek, Dead Indian, Evans Valley, Jacksonville and Central Point are all equally good and represent long hours and possibly days of preparation. Corn stalks that tower high above visitors, and sunflowers nearly as high are seen in many of the booths, some of which have special characteristics.

A remarkable exhibit is shown by the Lake Creek grange, taking into consideration its large variety of material. It has an interesting display of feeding pots, bowls and arrows, kitchen utensils and other articles, painstakingly carved out of Yew wood. On a large board are displayed 72 different kinds of woods that grow in that district. Another local display, various specimens of wool and mohair. In addition to an interesting display of food products, canned goods and fruits, the booth also has small mineral display.

Agates Displayed
Like other booths, the Central Point grange also has an interesting display, of which seven varieties of agates are shown in the district forms an important part. A \$700 collection of agates, all around by a resident of the section, is another feature, as well as an exhibition of poultry and dairy products.

The well known collection of Indian pipes found on the William Hittie ranch near Gold Hill is a part of the Sams Valley grange exhibit. The pipes are believed to be centuries old and were only unearthed a comparatively short time ago. One pipe is still encased with the ashes of the material the ancients used for smoking. A fig tree branch with real figs, grown in the valley, and a two-year-old pineapple bush encourage the belief that Sams Valley is possibly in a semi-tropical country instead of being one of the most fertile farming areas in southern Oregon and Jackson county. The booth also has an interesting display of canned goods, including salmon fish and venison, and an assorted variety of farm products.

Gemstone Is Shown
As part of its exhibit the Evans Valley grange displays several blocks of granite, high grade in appearance. In addition to an assorted display of vegetables, flowers and canned goods. When looking at this exhibit, the visitor has every reason to believe that indeed the Evans Valley district is another wonderful farming country. To enhance the attractiveness of the booth, "Evans Valley" is spelled out in large, red, delicious apples. The Rogue River booth, in addition to its creditable display of farm products is made even more attractive by large bouquets of fragrant gladioli. It has an exhibit equal to any in the building and has attracted many visitors to inspect its variety of products.

50 Pound Watermelon
A 50-pound watermelon is one of the features of the Talent booth and a show case full of pears and home-baked bread is another. Like other booths it has a most interesting exhibit of farm and garden products. At one side stands a sunflower stalk with a flower nearly 18 inches across.

The Jacksonville grange booth is also representative of long and careful preparation and displays a variety of good appearing vegetables, grains and canned fruits. Grain is practically part of each exhibit. The exhibits of fruits in the center of the building is creditable despite the fact that Elmer Outman, in charge of the building, and his assistants were unable to arrange as many exhibits as they had planned, due to the fact that near plucking is now at its height and pear growers are in no position to enter competitive displays as in former years. However, there are good commercial displays from Medford packing houses and the tables are practically filled up with exhibits of Bosc, Seckel, d'Anjou, Howell, Bartlett and Comice varieties. **Exhibit Big Peaches**

because of its large sized fruit and includes the Elberta, J. H. Hale, Tassan Cling and Muir varieties. Walnuts of the Manzanillo, Franquette and Improved Franquette varieties, which won sweepstakes prize at the international stock show at Portland last year, are on display by E. E. Foss, a well known county rancher.

An interesting individual farm exhibit was entered by Mrs. J. F. Hubbard of the Honey Ann district. She displays a stalk of tobacco and a surprisingly large variety of vegetables and produce. The same is also done by George Martin, who has ranch property near the town of Rogue River. His exhibit pretentiously fills a table.

In addition to the farm and grange exhibits, the Eden Valley and Villa Nurseries, the Stewart Andersons, Fisher Blend Flour company and the Monarch Seed & Feed company have interesting booths. The interior of the building has been decorated for the four days of the fair with colored bunting and the ceiling has also been equipped with colored lights, making the Horticultural building one of the biggest attractions of the fair.

STRIKE LEADERS CONTINUE ACTIVE DESPITE THREATS

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Investigation of the kidnapping and flooding of communist union organizers was being conducted by state authorities under direction of Governor O. Max Gardner today, while labor leaders planned to carry through their program in North Carolina's textile centers despite purported threats against their lives.

Hill Dunne, secretary of the communist party in the United States, said that international labor defense officials would conduct a previously announced mass meeting in South Gastonia Saturday regardless. Ben Wells, communist leader from England and organizer for the National Textile Workers' union, who was kidnapped with two other organizers and flopped Monday night by a mob of several hundred self-styled "anti-communists," said members of the mob told him that if they found him or any other union organizer in Gastonia county their bodies would be found riddled with bullets. Wells, still ill from the flooding, and the two other organizers, said they would return to Gastonia despite the threat.

CUDAHY SCION DIES KEELEY CURE HOME

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—They learned yesterday of a period of the death at Dwight D. Hospital of John T. Cudahy, son of the late John C. Cudahy, millionaire banker, business leader here. Cudahy died at the home of Andrew Mickelson, a barber, to whose home he was taken a week ago by two men who remained with him until death. The death certificate ascribed death to myocardial infarction and gave Cudahy's age as 46. Mrs. Mickelson said Cudahy was seriously ill when he arrived. The Mickelson home is known as a hangout for patients at the Keeley cure institute.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 12.—(Special)—Formation of the Western States Exposition association probably was the most outstanding thing accomplished at the California Diamond Jubilee state fair, participated in actually by 48 of the western states. Answers from the five western states who were unable to be present this year already have been received by the newly-formed association. Each expressed a keen interest in the proposals and promised support of the program. Lowe, whose home is in Ashland, Ore., received congratulations from his governor the same night the association was formed. Other members of the association have heard similar sentiments.

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TILDENS CHANCES FOR 7TH VICTORY CONTINUE BRIGHT

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Bill Tilden's drive for his seventh national tennis championship is to be stepped, the stepping will have to be done by one of seven players.

Schrader's suit charges that Hrenning and Mrs. Schrader were intimate over a period extending from 1921 to 1929.

Rosenberg of Baltimore, charged with having taken up on credit in Mrs. Rosenberg's name and credit \$100,000 worth of jewelry from the John Wanamaker stores in New York and Philadelphia, pleaded not guilty to a charge of grand larceny today.

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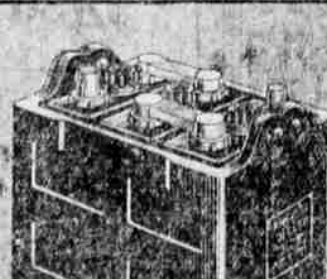
