

STUDENT BODY FINANCE WORK IS EFFICIENT

Medford High School System Model for Handling Funds Clubs and Classes - Detailed Report to Date Is Given.

The financial system of Medford high school is efficiently operating, in the financial report known in the district's financial system by the principal, Mrs. E. M. Conley. Although the financial systems are usually administered by the Associated Student Body, in Medford high school the principal has a complete check on all money collected for, or paid by, any school club, class, or organization. All money collected for the student body, or club, or office is paid into the principal's office and banked in a common account.

All funds disbursed are paid out only on requisitions signed by the members of the faculty responsible. All requisitions for the disbursement of student body funds must be signed by Principal E. M. Conley, and all requisitions for disbursement of club or class funds must be signed by the faculty advisors.

Merchants and townpeople are warned that nothing should be sold to any student unless a requisition, properly signed, and correct-

ing the amount of the purchase is presented. The school authorities will not assume responsibility for any merchandise purchased without the proper requisition.

Whereas the student account is \$175.98 overdrawn at present time, there is a total deposit of \$22.00 in school savings in the Associated Student account. Thus the Associated student body has a total of approximately \$197.98 on hand in student savings to start the new year 1929. A total of over \$23,000 was collected and paid out through the principal's office in handling the financial system of the school last year, without a single cent being lost through mismanagement. This is a record that testifies to the efficiency of the financial system now being administered by Principal E. M. Conley of the high school.

Medford Setting Pace for Big Cities In Development of Airport, Is View of Visiting Boeing Co. Publicity Man

Medford is setting a pace for larger cities of the country in its airport development, said Harold Cray, advertising and publicity manager of the Boeing company, of Seattle, who spent today in Medford with Seely Hall, Medford representative of Pacific Air Transport.

Cities which formerly competed for rail lines now contend for air lines and this year \$500,000,000 is being spent by American municipalities in acquisition and development of airports indicating the importance of air lines to the future of transportation, said Cray.

“Airports which were accepted a few years ago will no longer be used by airplane companies, and the present Medford airport development will not only meet present, but future demands,” he said.

In the past two years there has been a remarkable expansion of commercial flying,” said Cray. “Aid, express and passenger planes operating on regular schedules over established routes, now fly 30,000 miles a day and approximately 140 cities in 30 states now have regular airplane service.

“Medford, by investing \$120,000 in the airport development, insures its future on the air mail map. Large tri-motored transports, which can now be landed at Barber field only in emergency, will be attracted to your new airport, which not only has all the physical setup necessary to land and take off planes, but is equipped with an administration and staff headquarters, which add to the comfort and convenience of air travelers.”

“The Boeing companies have an active expansion program under way,” said Cray, “including extra work at the big Seattle factory where 1470 men and women are employed making military and commercial planes; early inauguration of a 20-hour night and day flying schedule between San

In his government Mussolini held eight posts—minister of foreign affairs, marine colonies, war, aviation, etc.

Now the powerful Italian resigns seven of his eight cabinet offices, remaining premier and minister of the interior only.

The king announces the changes by royal decree. Mussolini told him what to announce.

The years are passing. Mussolini knows it, and seeks to build a government machine that will survive.

The Italian question is “After Mussolini, what?”

Lord Rothmere, in a signed article, asks Britain to give up the mandate and withdraw from Jerusalem. He thinks Jews would prefer “a national home in the United States to patriarchal poverty in Palestine.”

A majority of Jews do prefer such a home. There are only 2500 American Jews among the 160,000 in Palestine.

But for a minority there is a passionate desire to restore Jerusalem. It may not be understood by a Scotchman not interested in returning to Edinburgh, but a Frenchman who never loses the memory of Paris understands it.

Using his powerful newspapers trying to make Britain drop the mandate for Palestine and Iraq as “dangers,” Lord Rothmere says the Balfour declaration involves no moral responsibility and was made, as a war measure, “to appeal to Zionist Jews, who were particularly strong in Germany and Austria.”
