WOMEN'S WORK DRAWING MANY FAIR VISITORS

At this time of year, both genders belong to the "fair sex," a fact eloquently brought home this morning by the fact that the women were showing considerable interest in exhibits alleged to appeal to the masculine attention only. While the Women's building was the scene of a steady stream of women sight seers, who lingered with wrapt admiration before the displays of fancy needle work and showed more than a passing interest in which articles were to receive the first prize.

One of the most elaborate and varied exhibitions of women's creative genius ever seen in the state of Oregon decorated the walls and bank the tables and show cases in the Women's building. One individual display of 14 pieces attracted admiration this morning including a baby's bed spread, pillow cases, a woman's dress, a carriage set, table napkins and a couple of dolls, the entire beautiful set was made out of unbleached flour sacks.

Patch work quilts, in designs that would make the head swim trying to figure out their intricate, lined the walls—one group being entered by women over 85 years of age. Rag rugs, hooked and crocheted, created no end of interest. One of these depicted a view of Crater Lake, another a marine scene—some were made from worn out overalls—others from discarded silk stockings.

The judges, just beginning to award the ribbons on needle and fancy work entries before noon, had an until press time affixed the first prize tags on the following: White embroidered centerpiece entered by Mrs. C. D. Elhart of Ashland; white center piece by Mrs. A. B. Cornel, Grants Pass; colored center piece, Mrs. C. D. Elhart; table cover with deep crocheted edging, Mrs. F. A. Johnson of Medford; table cover, Mrs. A. B. Cornel; white luncheon set, Mrs. Ada Ryan, Medford; cut work luncheon cloth, Mrs. Clara Heeling; bridge luncheon set, original card design, Mrs. A. B. Cornel; white luncheon set with crocheted trim, Mrs. Ada Ryan; luncheon set in filet, Mrs. L. A. Roberts of Ashland; white scarf, Mrs. T. A. Bird.

The judges will continue placing their awards throughout the afternoon. Each article is tagged with a serial number, with no names affixed, so that the group of judges have nothing to guide them in their choices, but the actual quality of work before them.

Mrs. Elsie McMerriek and baby were callers on Mrs. S. A. Dusenbury Wednesday afternoon.

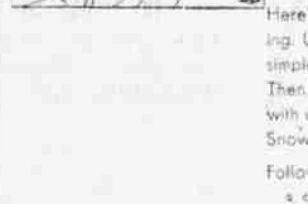
