

## CHARLES HALL CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Portland Telegram to Publish Announcement Today  
—Platform Expected to Include State Resource Development Plank.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP)—The Portland Telegram, in a signed story today will say that Charles Hall, state senator from Coos county and prominent for years in Oregon financial circles, will be a candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

"He has so informed intimate friends," the article will say, "and it is expected that his formal announcement will be forthcoming within the next few weeks."

Senator Hall, who is completing the first half of his third term in the state senate, was a candidate for governor in the 1922 primaries, Ben Olcott winning the Republican nomination.

Hall is now president of the Pacific Bancorporation. Before organizing this banking business he was engaged in telephone company operation. He organized the state chamber of commerce in 1919.

The Telegram will say: "What planks Hall will incorporate in his platform is, of course, problematical, but it is certain to contain a constructive plank on the development of the state's resources."

## SAFEGWAY CHIEF ATTENDS STORE GATHERING HERE

M. B. Skaggs, president of Safeway stores, who has his home and headquarters at Oakland, California, was in Medford Thursday evening to attend the district meeting of the store personnel of the Medford district.

Medford is headquarters for several stores operated in southern Oregon under the management of J. F. Mashburn, and the employees

of these stores, including the local executive personnel, were present at the meeting which was of inspirational nature.

As president of Safeway Stores, Inc., M. B. Skaggs is the directing head of about 2,200 retail food stores, numerous warehouses, and several manufacturing plants. The total volume of business said to be done by the Safeway organization in excess of \$200,000,000 annually.

They employ about 10,000 people, some \$12,000,000 in capital, and serve a territory extending from the Atlantic coast to and including the Hawaiian Islands and from the Mexican border up to and including western Canada.
