

MUSSOLINI IN REVIEW OF EFFORTS

Achievements of Fascism Recounted in Address to Grand Assembly On Eve of Relinquishing Cabinet Posts — Views Conflict With Opinion of Pope On Education.

ROME, Sept. 14.—(AP)—On the morrow of sweeping reorganization of the fascist ministry, with the relinquishing by the duke of all but one of his cabinet posts, Premier Benito Mussolini today reviewed the work done by the fascist government in an address to the grand assembly of the party in the Venezia palace.

About him sat the great leaders of fascism, and in front of him was the upper hierarchy of the party.

The duke, after recounting the government's achievements and its plans for land reclamation on a vast scale, dwelt at length on the relations between church and state. Before going on to take up the intriguing question of the reorganization of the ministry.

He minimized the importance of certain differences of views between Rome and the Vatican, saying that the new rules established by the Vatican treaties were sound and good. But he emphasized the point that the change in name of the ministry of public instruction to the ministry of national education, was intended to confirm in the most explicit manner the principle that the state alone has not only the right, but the duty, to educate people instead of merely instructing them.

His views appeared to be somewhat in conflict with the previously expressed opinion of Pope Pius.

Speaking of the recent reorganization of the cabinet, the duke said the new administration bears still more the fascist imprint which, however, did not mean that the dictatorship did not permit criticism.

What is forbidden, he emphasized, is attack on what are the fundamental principles of the fascist revolution. Otherwise criticism was helpful.

He read a letter from Secretary General Turati, in which the prominent party leader expressed desire to return among the rank and file, having completed a term of three years in office.

who on reading the ordinance, which can still be obtained at the police station, had interpreted it to mean that a car could not double park long enough to allow a passenger to alight, or to be taken on. This misunderstanding caused most of present controversy.

When City Attorney John H. Cacklin and Bernard Roberts of the city planning commission explained this early in the discussion, an entirely different phase was given the matter, as the big feature of doing away with double parking that the merchants so strenuously objected to was their understanding that a car could not double park at all.

Nevertheless, the merchants present continued their efforts to have the council restore double parking as before, but when they perceived that the city officials would not do this until after a further trial, some merchants even claiming it would drive trade away from the city, tried to induce

Salem Lawyer and Chief of Police Prove Good Forest Fire Fighters, But State Forester Has Big Heart

SALIM, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP) A telephone appeal to Governor Patterson by Walter C. Winslow, Salem lawyer, and chief of Police Frank Minto of Salem, who were drafted into the fighting service in Douglas county, today caused State Forester F. A. Elliott to send an order to Douglas county wardens for their release. It is understood that the order includes all of the Winslow party who were drafted.

Governor Patterson today refused to comment on his telephone conversation and told newspapermen to "see Elliott." The state forester said the governor had turned the matter over to him.

The Winslow party was drafted, and fought fires all day yesterday, on direct orders from Elliott. Winslow for several years has protested at executive orders deferring the hunting season and once sought to enjoin the enforcement of such an order, then as usual, he took an party into the woods to remain in camp until the first rainfall that will enable the governor to lift the ban.

It was said that Winslow and Minto appeared for release so they could return home to attend to "important business matters."

The order placing the party on the battle line against fires has excited much interest in Salem.

Parking Limit Abused
It was generally admitted by the merchants engaged in the discussion and the city officials that it was the general abuse of double parking and the hour parking limit. In view of this new ordinance that brought about the present abject situation and the fact was brought out by a number of the speakers that some business men and their employees were offenders along with theatergoers, parking their cars for hours in the business section, thus taking up needed space which could be used by shoppers.

It was generally admitted that if the hour parking provision was strictly enforced it would greatly relieve the auto parking congestion in the business district. Many theatergoers are in the habit of parking their cars in the business district while they attend theater performances.

Saturday Night Limit
It was the general consensus that to extend the hour parking limit from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m. Saturdays would tend to much relieve the traffic congestion of Saturday nights, hence the council's vote to make such extension, starting with today.

The mayor and councilmen declared that the double parking elimination, along with the enforcement of the hour limit of parking, etc., should be given a fair trial over a period long enough to demonstrate whether these features were feasible. One Saturday night and one week was not long enough for such a trial, they held.

As to the merchants' efforts to have the councilmen fix a five minute maximum double parking limit, the councilmen remained silent, even when at the suggestion of J. D. Roberts, the merchants present by a three-four vote called on the council to vote on the proposition.

After much more silence on this phase of the question, with the merchants still urging that the council as on record as having five minutes double parking limit, the councilman making a motion for such a vote, Mayor Pipes finally said he would call for a record vote, and no one objecting, instructed City Recorder Alfred to call the roll. All the councilmen except E. M. Wilson were present, and they voted "no" unanimously.

The mayor, councilmen, and members of the city police department present had argued during the discussion that to enforce a five-minute double parking limit would require the services of a small army of enforcement officers, that such a limit was unfeasible, impractical, would be very costly in the tax payers, and would make

ROSBURG, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP) Walter C. Winslow, attorney, Frank Minto, Salem chief of police and Charles Vick, auto dealer, were today released from their jobs as fire fighters by orders of Governor Patterson.

The men were drafted by the Douglas county fire patrol Thursday. They were released, according to information received by Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the county patrol, after they agreed to pack up their hunting equipment and return to Salem.

They had planned to go to Winslow's home in the Douglas county forest, which is closed to hunters, but which Winslow could enter by reason of being a settler.

The foreman stated that he would like to keep the three men as they proved yesterday to be good workmen and entered into the job industriously. According to Southwick, he is glad to recommend them to any one needing good workmen. One of the men, however, developed sore feet and the governor's order for their release came just in time to save him from a day as kitchen police.

Greatest Good Sought
All during the last night's discussion both sides made it plain that they were striving to bring about parking regulations that would be of the greatest good to the people generally, without working any hardship on the merchants.

Chief of Police McCredie and City Traffic Officer Prescott took part in the discussion, and City Attorney Frank P. Farrell, who succeeds John H. Carlin on October 1, was also present, but as a silent spectator.

Wm. S. Bolger, main speaker for the merchants, in opening the discussion said the merchants in objection to the double parking elimination, which had been "suddenly sprung" on the people last Saturday, came before the council not in a fault-finding, petty or small spirit, but to promote the best interests of the people as they saw it. The merchants realized that the city officials had a hard job to reach the best solution of the traffic problem, he said, but nevertheless the merchants were much in earnest in their objection to doing away with double parking.

Merchants Present
Among the merchants taking part in the discussion were John C. Martin, Charles A. Mosker, J. D. Roberts, A. H. Miller, Leland and Emil Brophy, R. Jones, Henry Fisher, Wm. Lydard and H. E. Marsh.

H. T. Hubbard, who sat with the merchants, and himself a former merchandise dealer of much experience, declared that the new traffic ordinance was a good step by the city officials in trying to get at the traffic problem, and that its enforcement would not drive any trade away from the city, and neither would the old ordinance. Where would such trade go, he asked. He said the people would cooperate.

Better Understanding
One result of last night's meeting was that both city officials and the merchants had a better understanding of the general congested traffic situation, and the problems that faced each, although they had a friendly deadlock and the merchants did not gain the chance they sought. Both sides had stood by their guns.

HOLLYWOOD IN SLENDER LEAD COAST LEAGUE
