Profits In Fish.

Sportsmen of Southern Oregon are gratified to learn that the state fish and game commission is strengthening its patrol on the lower part of Rogue river in an effort to check illegal fishing and safeguard the steelhead which is threatened with destruction.

In preserving the Rogue as a vacation retreat and a "complete anglers' paradise," there is something beside sentiment and scenery. There is sound business sense.

We speak of "commercial" fishing—meaning the process by which a fish is finally sold over a grocery store. We do not stop to think that a fish is sold far more profitably when it is left in the water, for the customer to serve himself in the fashion adopted in many progressive shops.

From the standpoint of the state and the immediate neighborhood there is a lot more money in an uncaught live fish, than in a canned dead one and there is a further advantage in the fact that the money that the sportsman

spends, scatters at once through the community, and makes more business for many businesses.

There is, of course, a legitimate place for the salmon industry—for commercial fishing, in the ordinary sense, but it must be so defined that there will still be room—and fish—for the sportsman who willingly spends his money, not for fish, but for the privilege of fishing.

As the Medford Mail Tribune points out:

The cannery companies would be acting in their own self interest if they would throw their support aggressively behind the sportsman and the upholding of the fish laws. Such action unquestionably would stop illegal fishing and also give the canneries that popular sympathy and support which would not only stabilize their business, but in all likelihood, render it increasingly profitable.

Highway Commission Surveyor.

Medford reports rejoicing at the Medford chamber of commerce surveyor and a state highway commission surveyor are discovering an outlet to the coast for Medford pears over the mountains between Williams and the Oregon Caves. The matter will become law for the people who have the state highway commission in the spring, it is declared.

While it is not disclosed who is paying for the services of the state highway commission engineer his presence on the party is undoubtedly a good thing.

If it is discovered that a 4 percent grade over the mountains will provide a Medford route to the coast shorter by three miles than the present Pacific and Redwood highways, and that a 5 percent grade will give a road seven miles longer than the present route, the commission will know the facts.

The Medford story that Medford pears no longer will have to go east by rail, provided the Redwood parallel road succeeds, probably will be of interest to the Southern Pacific.

But if the Southern Pacific investigates the proposed road, it will find no cause for worry.
