Blackwell Hill an elevation of at least 2200 feet is necessary.

Mitchell was unable to find any landmark to fly by, and descended to a lower level and located the Pacific highway. He steered his course by it and was looking for a familiar object like the Owen-Oregon smelterstack, or Rocky Ann, when he crashed into the high power wires.

These wires became entangled in the propeller, and when Mitchell attempted to rise, he was held back by decreased power. Then he struck the high wires in the Ike Merriman yard, and nose-dived to earth.

Flattner said the damage to the plane would amount to about \$1,000.

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. In the brief space of a few hours, at least 14 persons plunged to their deaths yesterday in five geographically widely separated airplane accidents.

Six persons perished when a passenger plane crashed and burned at Meriton and Thorold, Ont.

Four died in an air collision over Chicago.

Two were killed at Berkeley, California, when a plane took fire in the air and crashed into a house.

A young woman (type-machine) jumper died at Wichita, when the airplane failed to function.

Near Minneapolis the pilot of a plane was killed when he lost control of it and made an unsuccessful parachute jump.

Twelve passengers in a telephoned plane from Denver which took the wrong route to Nebraska, narrowly escaped a possible death or injury in a forced landing in a rough field near Mead. The ship was almost wrecked.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Two airplanes collided at an altitude of 8000 feet here tonight, carrying four persons to their deaths.

The dead included both pilots and a passenger in each plane. They were dead before rescuers reached the wreckage.

The dead were identified as: Pilot Walter Meyers, licensed pilot.

Mrs. Benjamin Burke, his passenger.

Crone, seen by witnesses to be working frantically to prevent the collision, almost had his ship clear but the wing dipped slightly just when it appeared the pilots would be successful in their efforts to save their lives.

The tip of the lower wing of Crone's plane brushed the top wing of Meyer's ship and the two started to drop.

Locked wing to wing, the two ships began to turn over slowly like a beautifully executed "falling leaf" of the stunt flyers. They straightened out and for the slightest instant leveled off, then dropped like a plummet.

REDFORD, N. Y., Sept. 14.—(AP)—Six persons, including two women and two children, were burned to death shortly after a wreck to-night after a monoplane belonging to Skyway, Ltd., of Toronto, crashed in a field between Meriton and Thorold, Ont.

The plane caught fire after the crash and its occupants were burned beyond recognition. The pilot was Frank M. Bradford, of Toronto. The names of the other occupants of the plane had not been learned early tonight.

The bodies were removed to St. Catherine's, Ont.

Chief of Police Grant Collins, of Thorold, who visited the place of the wreck and who said he helped to remove the charred bodies of two women, two children and two men from the debris, said the accident happened about 6:10 p. m.

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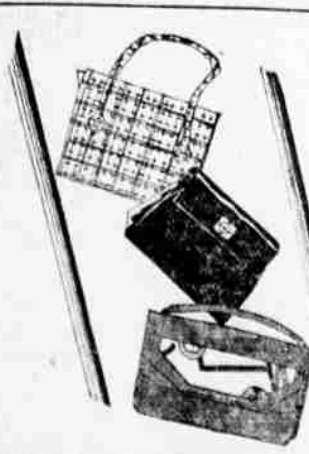
