'THUNDERBOLT' IS GRIPPING DRAMA OF UNDERWORLD

Hunt's Craterian theater switched to entertaining drama again for the next three days when "Thunderbolt," a gripping play with George Bancroft as the star and an excellent supporting cast opened yesterday. It is an entirely different underworld play from any ever seen here with the plot centering in a penitentiary where two condemned men are awaiting execution. Pay Way and George Arlen play the leads.

"Thunderbolt" holds a gripping, tense interest on the audience from beginning to end and contains enough shooting, fights with police and bloodthirstiness to satisfy the most fastidious. Despite its somewhat grim background the picture possesses an absorbing force story.

In the opinion of this reviewer, George Bancroft, that great depic- tor of human coles and passions of a clear, resonant voice and appearance of great physical strength, does the best actor of his moving picture career in his depiction of the hardened crook and killer whose fearlessness, humor, arrogance and bestiality are softened a trifle with a com- pletory sense of fairness, humor and lack of cruelty.

Bancroft actually plays the char- acterization so well that he gives the character of Thunderbolt an un- mistakable likeableness and sym- pathy. He retains his humor, bestiality and apparent indiffer- ence to death up to the time he enters the prison electrocution room where the story ends.

The grimness and pathos of the picture are broken up by scattered bits of humor, although the com- edy of fully pardoned, usually a 100 per cent character actor, as the prison warden seems far stretched and totally out of place with the tragedy of the prison scenes.

The killer crook and a young bank employee are in love with the same girl and the condemned crook a short time before his ex- ecution confesses that he framed his rival, who is also awaiting electrocution, thus saving the lat- ter from electrocution. This fur- nishes an unusual love story.

A laughable short talking com- edy, "Buddy Gandy" is on the same bill, which runs until Wed- nesday.

NEW HUP PHAETON HAS SPORT LINES

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 15.—Sev- eral innovations in sport lines mark the new 1930 Hupmobile six phaeton, introduced on August 11.

This phaeton has succeeded in creating an unusual harmony be- tween the straight body lines and the sweeping curves of fenders, doors and cowling. The result is a pleasing unity of design lines.

It incorporates the long, low lines characteristic of this new six. Yet its road clearance of 9.134 inches has not been decreased. Likewise the same new type of smartly extended fenders and dis- tinctively short running board are used.

The hood line from radiator cap to the sport cowl edge is straight. The windshield is slightly sloped rearward. Its stanchions, which are chromium plated as is the base in conformity with the curved surface of the cowl. The cowl in-

terfaces a new sportive note. In- stead of ending abruptly at the windshield base as in conventional practice, the cowl is extended to the rear and sharply curved forward at the outer edge. This par- ticular style is now followed in the designing of cowling for the speedy open cockpit airplanes used chiefly in pursuit work.

Another distinctive design note is the new styled doors and door fit- ments. The forward edge of both front and rear doors forms a straight perpendicular line. The rear edge of the front door slopes smartly backward and upward. The rear edge of the rear door follows the sweeping curve of the rear fender until just below the door handle from which it slopes smartly backward. Completing these harmonious lines is the top which, when folded, lies parallel with the body. The interior door handles are both flush with the door face, the handles being sub- merged in small wells.

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TOMATO PARTY IN ASHLAND CANNERY

Tomato parties are quite the latest in Ashland. And the most appropriate setting for such a social function, of course, is the cannery with its seasonal atmos- phere of fresh vegetables and fruits.

Yesterday found the Hagley Cannery, during about a large number of high school and normal school girls engaged in the excit- ing game of "peel the tomato," with an attractive award of 10 cents a peel offered for the ac- complishment.

The Sunday prizes for peeling was an increase of two cents over the regular prize scale. Due to the emergency still existing at the Ashland cannery, extra shifts of workers have been put on in order to give the regular staff of workers their day of rest.

From three o'clock Friday until to o'clock the next morning, 10 tons of tomatoes were turned into the cannery. These were in addi- tion to the regular run which had come in earlier.
