

CHINOOK SPEAKER OREGON CONGRESS IRRIGATION MEET

VALE, Ore., Sept. 17.—(P)—Fifty irrigation enthusiasts from all sections of Oregon were in Vale today attending the 15th annual session of the Oregon Reclamation Congress and to view the various irrigation projects under construction in the Vale district.

Officially the program opened yesterday morning with W. L. Powers, secretary of the congress, explaining the projects and costs of reclaiming alkali lands. C. M. Robinson, president of the state commercial club, which was host, issued the welcome to delegates.

W. C. Ide, manager of the state chamber of commerce, praised the spirit of Malheur county that has won for it the irrigation projects, Vale and Owyhee projects, that will irrigate 160,000 acres of land, were mentioned specifically.

Talks were made by E. C. Van Patten, R. G. Larson and Attorney Chinook of Grants Pass.

MANY JOBS OPEN IN CIVIL SERVICE

It is also understood that the visitors will visit the Squaw Lake district and view the mines in that vicinity and the site for the proposed dam of the Medford Water, Mining and Power company.

The two state officials are on a tour of western Oregon and have just spent several days visiting mining property and projects in Josephine county.

POSTMASTER TO ATTEND MEETING

Postmaster Wm. J. Warner left this morning on the southbound Pacific Air Transport mail plane for Sacramento, Cal., to attend the convention of the National Association of Postmasters, beginning today and lasting until over Friday.

He was in excellent company when passing through the air, as Charles Riddiford, the postoffice inspector in charge of the northwestern territory, and Postmaster C. M. Perkins of Seattle were also passengers on this plane, having boarded it at Seattle. The three postoffice officials were to land at Oakland, Cal., from which city tomorrow morning they will be taken in a special plane to Sacramento.

The report that Postmaster Warner took along with him today a pair of smoked glasses and some binoculars, with which to view the scenery, proved a canard. It being his first airplane ride he only took along a prayer book and wore two parachutes in case of emergency.

WAIT REPORT ON AUTO SUSPECTS

No word had been received today by the sheriff's office in connection with three prisoners, N. J. Foster, Allen Kearney and John Crow, arrested by officers over the week end. Foster is accused of embezzling a car from an automobile agency in Los Angeles and Kearney is alleged to have been interested with Foster in bringing the car north. Foster was arrested Saturday night and the two others were apprehended early Sunday morning. The trio is also alleged to have attempted to pass "bogus" money at the fair Saturday night in the form of Mexican pieces. Another report coming from the police indicated the men had attempted to pass old Confederate money of Civil War days.

Crow is not connected with Kearney and Foster, according to the declarations of the prisoners, as far as bringing the car to Oregon is concerned. Local authorities had today expected to receive further information on which to hold the men.

NEW OWNER TAKES OVER DAILY NEWS

Llewellyn A. Banks, wealthy fruit broker of Riverside, Calif., and the largest single owner of orchard property in Jackson county, yesterday took over the ownership of the Medford News, and the first issue of the paper under his personal direction was sent out to subscribers this morning.

In his public announcement Mr. Banks declared the paper would stand for a complete separation of government and business, and be devoted to community betterment and upholding the traditions of the Christian faith.

C. Ellington Harp, formerly of Grants Pass, is the new managing editor, Dan Bowman remaining as assistant editor. C. A. Swigart, former business manager, retires, while Lee Tuttle, former managing editor, takes his place and will also act as editor-in-chief.

The News will move to its new home on West Main street in about a week.

CENTRAL POINT HOME DESTROYED BY BLAZE

Fire of undetermined origin Saturday night destroyed the large two-story dwelling of the Otton estate in Central Point. The fire had gained such headway before it was discovered that efforts to save household goods were reported to have been futile. The building was tenanted by a southern California family, moving into the building three days or so before the fire to spend the winter here to enjoy hunting and fishing. The dwelling had only been sold a week before to Mrs. James Wilson by Thomas Pankey, administrator of the estate, through a Central Point real estate agency. The loss was covered by insurance.

Saturday's fire was the fifth or sixth in that city this summer, exacting a toll of four destroyed dwellings and one barn.

Dr. Charles Minor Cooper, famous specialist of San Francisco, who was spending his vacation at his McLeod fishing club in northern California was called, and diagnosed the disease as trichinosis, a very rare ailment, caused by eating pork which has been inadequately cooked. Several of Mrs. Tucker's friends in San Francisco were similarly affected, and the cause was traced to a hotel luncheon in the Golden Gate city. Mrs. Tucker, while improving, will probably be forced to remain in the hospital for several weeks. One of her friends is reported in a far more serious condition. For several years Mr. and Mrs. Tucker, who are very prominent socially in San Francisco, have been spending their summers on Rogue River.
