

FALSE REPORTS OF LAKE LODGE CLOSURE HEARD

Season Does Not End Until
Sept. 20—Fine Weather,
Perfect Roads Lure Many
Crater Visitors — "No
Snow" Record Looms.

CRATER LAKE, Ore., Sept. 17.—(Special.) Numerous reports visiting the lake seemed under the impression that the lodge closed Sunday evening, Sept. 15. They have been misinformed for the lodge remains open until September 20th. Others have been formed along the various routes that the lake was shrouded in mist and clouds, and that the roads were impassable. Also very much distant from fact. The weather is as warm as it has been at any time this season, and the roads are in perfect condition.

For the past week visibility at Crater Lake has been very poor because of the great fog of smoke that has hung over the country. However, the wind changed favorably for a short time yesterday and gave the numerous visitors a chance to see Crater Lake as it really is. Exceptionally warm weather has prevailed for the past four or five days and it can hold out for four more days the season will end with a "no snow" record. This would be an unusual record for a season, for nearly all the past seasons have enjoyed from 15 to 20 inches of snow in the middle of September.

LAKE VISITORS TOTAL 120,356 STILL COMING

Best Previous Record Far in
Rear—6069 People Entered
Park Last Week—
Many Planes Pass Over
Crater.

Exceeding last year's entire total of 112,222 visitors for the season, there had been 120,356 visitors in the Crater Lake National park up until last Saturday, according to a report from the park headquarters today. With the succession of 91 bright, sunny days, the visitors to the lake have enjoyed the most perfect summer season in the history of the park.

Last week 6069 people entered the park as occupants of 1834 private cars, an increase of 49.9 per cent in the number of people and 39.9 per cent in cars for the corresponding week last year. Thirty-four visitors came by other means, making a total of 6069 for the week, as compared to 4676 for the same week in 1928. The increase for the season so far for the number of visitors is 11.23 per cent over last year, when the total was 108,693 at this time of the year. With the annual drought through this section of the Cascades, the first demon has been tempted to spread destruction. Screen Life in Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD.—Things sometimes move slowly in this magic city where ephemeral ideas go into the movie mill to emerge with magic rapidity as concrete screen entertainment. Ten years have passed since Warner Oland, one of Hollywood's favorite "menaces" first was considered for the part which now is accepting him, during working hours, in the costume of Sax Rohmer's "Invisible" Dr. Fu Manchu.

Manchu. About a decade ago, Rex Ingram, the director, was thinking of giving the story of this veno-maniac and oriental, and had Oland in mind for the role of Fu. But something happened, and the picture was not made. Not long ago, Oland recalls, he was approached by another director concerning the same role—and again nothing came of it. Now, however, a picture actually is being made of the novel, and (and lo!) the man who is supposed to play "Invisible" is Warner Oland.

"Believe It or Not"
Oland, although the fact seems belied by his decided, brunt character, hails from Sweden, where men mainly are fair. He has omitted characters from almost every other nation of the world, but likely never will portray one of his own.

He is fond of the oriental roles in which, he says, only chance first led him to appear on the screen. It was 12 years ago, and he was cast for a part in the old serial "Patric" with Irene Castle and Milton Sills—the picture, incidentally, which inspired a letter from President Wilson requesting its withdrawal because its representation of Mexico and Japan as the "conspirators" against America might be dangerous to international relations.

Oland was to be a South American in the picture, but there was difficulty over the role of the oriental who was to be the big member. The player selected did not suit, so they asked Oland if he thought he could fill in. "Sure," said Warner. And many such roles have followed.

Appropriately to one who frequently leads such a screen life, Oland is a student of Chinese and Hindu philosophy.

"Just Mergin."
The mercurial fever among the big studios of Hollywood of course could not pass without giving rise to a new crop of wisecracks. Said an actor the other day when asked for whom he would be working next: "Oh, I'm not certain. Just guessing around you know."

Which, reminds, incidentally, that practically all Lloyd's feature pictures have progressed to the preview stage before being titled finally. "T. N. T.," regarded as a splendid box-office title, was favored for the present production until it was learned that an "educational" sex film now in circulation is similarly labeled.
