FOREST RANGERS EXAM TO BE HELD

A civil service examination for the position of forest ranger will be held at the forest supervisor's office in Medford on October 29, according to announcement received this morning by Supervisor Hugh B. Rankin.

The examination is open to men between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-five except that those who have not applied to persons entitled to preference because of military or naval service, but such applicants must not have reached the retirement age which is sixty-two years for forest rangers.

Applicants must be in sound physical condition and good health, unblemished and capable of enduring hardships and performing labor under trying conditions. They must show that they have had at least nine months of field experience in forestry work dealing with such activities as lumbering, grading, surveying, forest-fire control, and the like.

Forest rangers are responsible to the forest supervisors for the protection and management of the districts consisting of from 50,000 to 100,000 acres. Considerable travel is required, and rangers must expect to spend much of their time away from their headquarters.

Protection of the district against fire is the primary duty, and involves the supervision of fire guards during the dry seasons and the handling of fire-fighting crews. Fire protection calls for careful planning, an efficient organization, and often long and strenuous hours of riding and hard manual labor.

Rangers carry out plans for the development of the physical resources of their districts and for the checking of timber. They handle the field work in connection with the sale of timber, the grazing of livestock, and other business activities in their districts. They also do such work as building and maintaining telephone lines, trails, cabins, and fences.
